# 20th ANNIVERSARY SEASON FEATURES SHAKESPEARE UNDER THE STARS

"The Dream comes alive in Belfast this summer" is the triumphant cry of the **Belfast Maskers** theater troupe as they prepare to celebrate their 20th anniversary season. The "Dream" refers to Shakespeare's A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM to be performed under the stars for 10 consecutive nights starting July 26 at Steamboat Landing Park. Artistic Director Aynne Ames says, "The Maskers wanted to celebrate this milestone in a very public way and it seemed that doing Shakespeare out-of-doors on the harbor with great music, lighting and wonderful costumes would be an event to encompass the whole community."

DREAM was chosen for its family appeal, and the suitability for the outdoor setting. "I thought it to be an enchanting mix for an early evening on the waterfront," says Ames. DREAM is a romantic comedy that portrays the adventures of four young Athenian lovers and a group of amateur actors in a moonlit forest, and their interactions with the forest-dwelling fairies and the Duke of the Athenians. Ames also cited the lack of royalties as an attractive incentive.

When the Maskers approached the city for permission to use the public park, they soon found a base of support. Jim Bell, Director of Parks and Recreation said, "It is most gratifying to see the community coming together for a common purpose, and we are proud to be a part."

After getting the go-ahead from the city, Ames quickly put together a top creative team. The production will feature traditional music by Felix Mendelssohn and additional compositions by musical director A. Martin Smith, costumes and set by Nell Moore, choreography by Iveagh Gott and Dee Dee Burger, lighting and sound by Neal Harkness, hair and makeup by Diane Coller Wilson, and dramaturgy by Audra Curtis. Set designer Moore plans to incorporate the natural scenery. "The backdrop is a hedge of cedars and our stage is the grass. The fairies travel in 3 or more dimensions so we will construct scaffolding as an aerial stage. It's all about magic... well, magic and illusion. The fairies will be as magical as possible, they won't be your typical Victorian creatures scantily clad in yards of chiffon with gossamer wings sprouting from their shoulder blades; instead they'll blend into the forest and you won't notice them until they move. A tree might suddenly turn into a fairy," says Moore in a stream-of-consciousness style that seems common among creative types. Moore's designs have been seen in THE GOOD WOMAN OF SETZUAN, LION IN WINTER and RICHARD III among many productions for the Maskers.

Joining local Belfast talent ranging in age from toddler to septuagenarian, Ames is using several pre-professional college students. Audra Curtis (Dramaturge), Colin Whitely (Lysander), and Nate Speckman (Demetrius) are all USM theater majors. Bill Army (Oberon), Middlebury College, is the winner of 2007 Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival awards for Best Vocal Ability and Best Comedic Performance. Katie Meehan (Helena), Salem State College, was a finalist for a KCACTF Irene Ryan acting award. Curtis, Speckman and Army were all nominees for the Irene Ryan acting award. Also in the cast are Lee Parent (Hermia), Greg Marsanskis (Theseus), Kelli Palmer (Titania) and Erik Perkins (Puck).

Ames says, "This waterfront show is a seed program. If it works well, it will become an annual event."

It was a chance meeting at a 1986 Christmas party that inspired the late

Basil and Nancy Burwell, and Diane Wilson to start the theater group. Basil, known to his friends as Bazz, had a lifetime of experience in professional and academic theater, and had just retired from Philadelphia's Walnut Street School; Nancy studied with Maria Ouspenskaya in New York and had worked a few seasons in summer stock "way back when"; and Diane is a graduate of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. At the time, Belfast had no resident performing group. That spring they gathered a number of eager amateurs for a dramatization of P. G. Wodehouse's comic story UNCLE FRED FLITS BY. The first production proved a disaster when the actor cast in the leading role failed to show up for dress rehearsal and refused to go on with the show. On opening night, Diane and Bazz stood at the door of Belfast Free Library's old Abbott Room apologizing to those who had come to see the play.



Bazz wrote in a 1998 program, "Obviously we had gotten ahead of ourselves. We realized we needed to gather a group of committed people and work with them to find out what they were capable of and where their interests lay. We needed to form a company of sorts – before we cast a play and invited an audience." The result was a series of acting workshops open to anyone interested. This group of acting students created the first actual production in the traditional English mummers' style. ST. GEORGE AND THE DRAGON was performed in grange halls and community centers around Waldo County in the weeks before Christmas, 1987.

"It was a delightful show, but the real success was the formation of the company," Bazz wrote. Within a year the group was incorporated as The Belfast Maskers, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Its mission was, and continues to be, to provide a wide range of high quality theater experiences with, and for, the community. It is estimated that more than 1000 different people have volunteered with the Maskers in the past 20 years.

Diane Wilson has remained a steadfast member of the Maskers, doing hair and makeup for most of the productions for 20 years. She has also acted in many shows, notably as Kate in TAMING OF THE SHREW, Nurse Ratched in ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST, and the title role in MEDEA. "Even after 20 years I have to say the most outstanding thing about my experiences with the Maskers was working with Basil Burwell. He was remarkable. On our first meeting, I was drawn to him from across the room by the twinkling energy and charisma of this older gentleman whom I'd never seen before," she recently reflected. "He not only had the gift of attracting people, he also gave everyone interested an opportunity to have a theatrical experience, to participate in expressing themselves in a creative new way. Bazz had the ability to bring out your personal best without making you feel like an instrument of his interpretation."

Lilias Outerbridge, now President of the Maskers Board, has also been involved since the early days. "We all knew so little about theater when Basil Burwell began working with us on plays. At least I knew nothing. We had no designated costumer or make-up person, no light or sound designer, per se. But one day Bazz said, 'For this next play we will need a stage manager. Who is willing to take that on?' To me it sounded simple: just moving the chairs around the stage as needed, so I volunteered! He promptly gave me a 500-page book on the subject. Since then I have been stage manager many times, as well as pretty much everything else except for lights and sound."

Lilias has appeared onstage in ELEEMOSYNARY, PINOCCHIO and PRELUDE TO A KISS to name just three. She says, "I have learned so much, and have worked with people of all ages I never would have met otherwise. For me, my time with the Maskers has been an exercise in group creativity – for no other purpose than the fun of it, to create something that would otherwise not exist," she said.

Designer Nell Moore, an architect, says, "Everything I know about set design I learned by doing it with the Maskers. When Bazz asked me to design the set for TWELFTH NIGHT in 1989 I knew nothing about it (although I do know something about costumes, art and architecture). There are many like me who started their careers in this theater and grew and blossomed there. It has been a wonderful learning experience."

For several years, the Maskers performed in a variety of spaces such as the Abbott Room, a former church, and the old Crosby School (now the home of the National Theater Workshop for the Handicapped). In 1992 the Maskers settled into a rented space shared with offices of the Belfast & Moosehead Lake Railroad. In the old railroad freight house on the waterfront, the Maskers created a proscenium stage with raked seating for 110 people using pews purchased from an old church. Local architect and Masker Larason Guthrie oversaw the renovation project using all volunteer labor. The first show in the newly completed Maskers' Waterfront Railroad Theater was 1993's PRIME

OF MISS JEAN BRODIE directed by Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts-trained professional actor Robert Hitt. Of BRODIE, USM theater professors and critics said, "This is community theater of the highest quality."

For much of the Maskers' first decade Burwell, who passed away in 1998, volunteered his time as Artistic Director. He established the custom of seeking out trained professionals to use as guest directors, and encouraging new talent as well. Though experienced directors were paid only a small stipend, Maskers attracted their participation by willingness to spend the necessary time in rehearsal (averaging 60-100 hours per play), full production values with innovative designers, and a commitment to quality. In 20 years, there have been many outstanding professional directors like Michael Toner (DANCING AT LUGHNASA), Gardner Howes (THE MOUSETRAP, LOST IN YONKERS), Robert Hitt (ANGRY HOUSEWIVES, LEND ME A TENOR, THE WEIR), William Lannon (KRAPP'S LAST TAPE, THE DUMBWAITER), Tobin Malone (A PERFECT GANESH, ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST), Matt Ames (OUR TOWN, ON GOLDEN POND), Richard Sewell (SOMEONE TO WATCH OVER ME), and Aynne Ames (THE BOYS NEXT DOOR, MEDEA), to name a few.

Directors who evolved within the Maskers include Larason Guthrie (THE BALD SOPRANO,THE CHERRY ORCHARD, THE WILD DUCK), Meg Nickerson (ANNE OF GREEN GABLES), Wendy Schweikert (SCAPINO, PROOF, METAMORPHOSES),) and Joe Swenson (ONCE UPON MATTRESS).

In mid-1995, Bazz handed the non-paying job of Maskers' Artistic Director to retired drama teacher Gardner Howes. Robert Hitt oversaw the troupe from 1998-2000. By then, the Maskers had grown into a substantial organization typically staging 7 productions. It had become impossible to find an artistic director who could do what had become a full-time job without a salary. Because of this need, a drive was begun to raise \$500,000 for an endowment fund, named the Basil Burwell Foundation. Contributions to this endowment help ensure the future success of the Maskers and are fully tax-deductible. Led by David Outerbridge and several stalwart members, it operates separately from the Maskers with its own board of directors. Although the fund is only slightly more than halfway to its goal, it now helps pay a small salary to an artistic director/house manager. The Maskers annual budget is currently \$85,000 with roughly 45% of total income derived from ticket sales. The remaining 55% comes in part from the endowment fund (approximately \$10,000 annually), from fund-raising events, program advertising and from personal and business contributions.

The first paid Artistic Director was Tobin Malone, who brought bold new changes to the group. Her vision included renovating the Waterfront Railroad Theater to a more intimate space with 75 raised seats, a three-quarter round stage and adding a scene shop and costume storage. This second renovation was overseen again by Larason Guthrie and a volunteer crew. Funds raised for the project included a generous donation from longtime Maskers supporter actress Liv Ullman, and her husband, hotelier Donald Saunders. At the 2001 dedication of the new stage, Ullman said, "This is where I come from: this kind of community, this kind of theater...to be here in Belfast and with the Maskers, I feel utterly comfortable. This is home."

When the B&ML Railroad relocated to Unity, the Maskers gratefully took over the space their offices had occupied in the building. Maskers gained an expanded lobby and rooms currently used for a costume shop, prop storage and rehearsal space. Malone also wrote and directed the Maskers first outdoor production, THE BOYS FROM SWANVILLE, which was enthusiastically received. In 2003, the Maskers were recognized as Business of the Year by the Belfast Area Chamber of Commerce.

Since 2004, Aynne Ames has been the Maskers' Artistic Director. Ames founded Castine's Cold Comfort Productions, which started as a community theater and evolved into a resident professional summer stock company. She graduated from UMO and studied ancient theater at the prestigious American School of Classical Studies in Athens, Greece. She states, "I have worked in several states and countries and in many theater genres, and very frankly I have been paid a great deal more. But at no time have I ever worked with more enthusiastic, devoted, passionate, creative, dedicated, generous artists of every ilk, than those I have found here in Belfast."

"Amateur doesn't mean inept, untrained, and non-serious; it means you LOVE what you're doing. All of us in the Maskers have been amateurs and that is what makes our theater special," says Nell Moore.

Under Ames leadership, the Maskers started a free once-a-month acting workshop for teenagers known as the Teen Team. This year the program is directed by educator Jennifer Tibbetts, and is expanding to incorporate the acclaimed methods of Arthur Strimling, founder of Roots and Branches Theater. Internationally recognized for its success in community outreach and artistic excellence, this program brings together older and younger actors, writers and technicians to create shows that speak to all generations. The Maskers also put on an annual theater camp for children ages 8-12 featuring workshops on dancing, lighting, audition techniques, costumes, stage combat, makeup and vocals. This year the 4th annual theater camp runs from July 9-20, 5 mornings each week, under the direction of USM Theater major Audra Curtis and 2 assistants. Theater camp is limited to 20 students chosen by application. (See our website www.belfastmaskerstheater.com for details.) The Maskers Variety Show, July 6 & 7, raises funds for the theater camp with fun-filled performances by local talent.

The Maskers are especially pleased, in this 20th anniversary year, to be

participating in the nationwide productions of Susan Lori-Parks' cycle 365 DAYS/ 365 PLAYS. Having won the Pulitzer Prize in 2001 for TOPDOG/UNDERDOG, the young African-American playwright set out to write a play a day for a whole year. In that spirit, Parks and producer Bonnie Metzgar planned a seven-city simultaneous world premiere of the plays, each hub theater reaching out to other theaters in the region. The Northeast Hub theater is the Long Wharf at Yale University, and the Maskers was chosen as one of those in the northeast to produce a seven-play cycle during the week of October 22nd through the 28th of this year. Producer Charlotte Herbold says, "Some of the plays are very short - revealing scraps of conversation - others are more complex. And the Maskers will infuse their seven performances with the diversity observable in Belfast. Not racial diversity, but a diversity of origins and ages-people from 'away' and native Mainers, working class participants as well as well-heeled retirees, old actors and young hopefuls--to bring home the spirit of the grand scheme."

The intention is to celebrate theater in American communities, and the Belfast Maskers are honored to be part of the festival. Diane Wilson sums it up very well when she says, "After 20 years of putting on plays together, the Maskers continue to draw from the remarkable spirit of Basil Burwell. We always strive for excellence."

# NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AT THE CHOCOLATE CHURCH

"I have an affinity for old buildings," said Roo Dunn, who came with his wife and young son from Philadelphia to Bath, ME, last year to be the Executive Director of **The Chocolate Church Arts Center** in this 1847 historic building on Washington Street.

A native of the Champaign-Urbana area in Illinois, Dunn is a graduate of the North Carolina School of the Arts. His background includes production manager for Artpark musical theater and grand opera productions in New York State; production manager for the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Pavarotti International Voice Competition; lighting and stage management for Bill Graham Productions (figure skating and gymnastic events); production and stage management for Baryshnikov Productions; producer and production manager for Shut Up & Dance!, benefit performances by the dancers of the Pennsylvania Ballet Company; and 12 years in operations and production services at the Pennsylvania Convention Center; as well as marketing and technology consulting for various companies.

So how did he end up in Maine?

"I've been trying to move north all my life! And my wife, Kate, is from Portland. Her folks are from Waterville, and her grandparents have a summer place on Indian Point down here. And I have been coming to Maine off and on as far as Portland for 20 years with different shows. For the 8 years Kate and I have been together we've been coming to the midcoast. Five and a half years ago we were married in Georgetown. It never occurred to us then that we would find a job in Bath, which is the perfect location and just the right size community. About six years ago we were walking around the Colby College campus in the middle of a snowstorm on Christmas night, and I said, 'So, you want to move back up?' and she said, 'You can start looking now.' It took six years and a little boy (Riley, now two) to work it out. Philadelphia is a fantastic city, but I didn't want to raise a little boy in an inner city neighborhood. We lived in a great area, but there are things you can't do in the city with a little boy. He can run up and down the street here, where there are four houses in the block, but not in a big city, where there are 90 houses to the block. And I like small towns and cities. Here we found a rambling 19<sup>th</sup> century Greek revival house on a quiet street."

You've been involved so much with dance. Is your wife a dancer?

"No, we share a vocation and avocation separate from the theater. She is a technical writer and educator and IT (Information Technology) project manager and contractor. She's trying to focus on several different markets, but one of them is small businesses, providing a more affordable service to do everything from training to specifying equipment. And she is the webmaster now for CCAC and will be updating the website when not working for her clients. Our web hosting is donated by a local vendor - very helpful."

How did you get started on this path?

"I started as a stage manager and lighting designer and always had an interest in dance because to me dance is arguably the purest art form (although my colleagues like Kevin [O'Leary - Lanyard Theatre Company] and Scott [Levy – Penobscot Theatre Company] disagree), especially Modern Dance when you're lighting and presenting the imagery of people in space – bodies in space. It's very pure and very complicated to do that because you have to constantly find a way to draw out the intent of what the choreographer is portraying – the choreography in life.

"My experience with Mikhail Baryshnikov was artistically some of the most fascinating work of my career. The White Oak Dance Project was a commercial operation. He didn't take a dance program on tour unless we made a certain amount, but that allowed him to do whatever he wanted, and at that time he was dancing in every show. But it was also one of the most difficult environments to work in – not because of him – he was certainly a very demanding artist and an incredible perfectionist – but because of the environment we traveled in: if we weren't on stage, we were in a TV studio, so it was travel, load in, load in a TV studio, reverse, show, late night broadcast taping or early morning, continually. But it was a wonderful experience working with some terrific choreographers and designers!



"My work has followed what seems like a natural, logical progression from stage management (I love calling a show but prefer to do a 'one off' rather than a run – I have a short attention span to be a really good stage manager!) to production management to producing and from there to the next big thing: operations management at the Convention Center. Trade shows are show business, too, with theatrical production values now. All that gave me experience working with six different unions, acting as liaison between the producers and the clients, speaking the language of IT, all of it valuable here working with various organizations to help us expand and improve our network.

"And now The Chocolate Church – well, it's kind of hard to come to New England and not work with an old building. But you know, old buildings were one of the reasons I moved to Philadelphia. One of my motivations for taking the job of production manager for the Opera Company of Philadelphia, aside from doing big opera, was to work in the Academy of Music, which was opened in 1857 and is the last full scale, more than 2000 seats, European style opera house left in the U.S. In fact, scenes in the film THE AGE OF INNOCENCE were filmed there because they were supposed to be in mid 19<sup>th</sup> century Europe.

"Our needs here are vast. We have a church building that's 160 years old. I have a note here that says, 'Belfry tower needs rather urgent remediation,' and unlike a steeple, a belfry is an entire building unto itself. So if you imagine the sanctuary, sitting next to it, a separate building but attached to it, is the belfry. Ours needs a great deal of work, as does our roof, as does our furnace. So our funding needs are huge and, unlike some venues, part of our mission is that we must preserve The Chocolate Church as a historic building on the National Register.

"Our mission is also to present affordable, diverse programming to our region, and we count among our region six counties. So unlike venues with contemporary buildings that they must maintain, we must preserve our building and maintain it, and do all the programming -- very challenging and very difficult. The organization has yet to develop an endowment plan, so we're doing it (funding) on an annual basis. Our next funding initiative will likely be a major gifts campaign to help promote business viability; that is, make us a consistently sustainable arts business. What happens with a lot of arts agencies is that you've got this huge swing (in funding needs) from low to high. To deal with this, we have to even that out, extend the period between dips and makes the dips more shallow. Our needs are so vast that we go from crisis to crisis, so the big goals are major gifts to create this sustainable business over several years and at the end of that several year period begin a capital campaign, which would serve several missions: preservation, new construction (the belfry, but we must keep the original look), performance funding, and endowment funding. It would do a little bit of everything, and that would have to last quite a few years, so there's probably 7 years or more of really rather complex funding just to get to the point of doing the major renovations that we need to do, to get a good foothold on doing the major restoration projects we need to do. And the challenge in that is whether or not our beloved and historic building is going to wait that long! It will be more than a quarter of a million dollars just to dismantle the bell tower and set it on the ground that's money you'll never get back again. Because it's its own building it's more complicated than taking a steeple off and setting it on the ground.. It's a fabulous structure inside. The original bell, cast in 1846, is still there."

How is theater going to be integrated in your programming?

"One of the issues we have here is that the bulk of our season is touring music: jazz, blues, folk, Maine artists. To do regional theater, which I think has a very important place in any arts center, means dedicating some time; or they have to rehearse during the day, we change over, do a concert at night, change over again. We don't really have the space to do that, and because this is a largely volunteer organization we don't have the crew to provide the change over. So if you use an example of a regional theater that might be running one show, rehearsing the next in a studio, close one show, maybe we do a couple of quick concert attractions, and open the next show - we're the flip side of that. We don't have the stage time to dedicate to it. It's an issue of getting the right collaboration between the theater and The Chocolate Church that will generate an audience (for regional theater it's a fairly large auditorium, 285 seats) plus finding the right time frame to do it so it doesn't misplace too much of the rest of our season and I can maintain the continuity of our music season but also serve the needs of the regional theater.

"One of our challenges is to grow with a season where we can serve a bigger, more diverse audience and at the same time grow with diversity in the programming. It's difficult because we're a regional performing and visual arts center, but we're limited in the number of performances a week that we do. The traditional season has roughly been one show a week from September to June. It's difficult when you do only one show a week to say you're a regional arts center. On the other hand, I could certainly book twice as many shows and have one every Friday and Saturday, but (1) I don't know if there's enough audience to support it, and (2) we're a staff of only two full time and two part time people and volunteers. And our ability to fund that much of a season is in question. I would love to do a show every Friday and Saturday night, but if I look around, even venues that only do music don't do two shows a week. So we're playing with that idea and looking at a lot of different possibilities, keeping in mind our traditional mission of blues, jazz, comedy, theater, but also looking for attracting an audience demograph of 18 - 24 and 25 - 34 age range, a younger age range. That does not mean that our traditional audience, which probably begins in the mid 30's and goes up, is not going to attend some of these, but I see this as a niche we need to try to get into. We'll probably get into it with a few shows next year and see how it goes.

"Our marketing is very limited because we don't have enough money for a lot of radio or for television – although some television time is donated – so it's relatively narrow in the local papers. We may try to find and work with a promoter rather than trying to promote it ourselves.

"We do have some theater on the way. **Penobscot Theatre Company's** production of I AM MY OWN WIFE, starring Gabriel Sigal (in the true story of the real life German transvestite who survived the Nazis and the East German Communists) will be here at 7:30 pm on April 7. This is exciting to me because Bath does not see a lot of dramatic theater. We want to continue to support Kevin O'Leary (**Lanyard Theatre**), now using our black box theater in mid-summer and late December, and see his company grow, perhaps to the use of our main stage eventually.

"From a May 10 morning preview performance through May 20, we'll have a co-production of JOSEPH AND THE AMAZING TECHNICOLOR DREAMCOAT with **The Studio Theatre of Bath.**" JOSEPH is being directed by Thom Watson, assisted by David Baker, with musical direction by Teresa Henderson, choreography by Joe Sibley, and stage management by Martina Duncan. Justin St. Louis will take the title role, and the part of the Narrator will be shared by Amanda McGuire and Leila Percy. Mark McNeil will be at the keyboard and in charge of the pit. Performances at 7:30 pm May 11, 12, 17 – 19, and at 2:30 pm on May 13 and 20. Call (207) 442-8455.

When I graduated from high school, back in the Stone Age, we used to have a get-together the night before graduation – to sign each other's yearbooks. My classmates, who knew that I was leaving for New York to start my acting career, wrote some very nice things in mine such as: "You're so talented, I know we'll be hearing about you in the future," and "Bob, I know your talent will take you to the top," and "You are a talented actor, Fraser, and I'm sure you'll end up in the movies some day." Well, armed with those assurances, I was confident that it was going to be easy for me to break into show business.

A few months later, while I was pounding the pavement around Broadway (and proof-reading the Manhattan phone book to pay the rent), I began to discover the truth about talent: It may be helpful to having a successful acting career – but it is ABSOLUTELY NOT ENOUGH to get you to the red carpet all by itself. What it really takes is: T.A.L.E.N.T.

T = Tenacity. Acting is a very difficult profession – not the acting part, that's usually 'fun' and not extremely taxing for most actors – but the business part is hard. Just getting up every day and TRYING AGAIN, in the face of massive rejection, drives most actors out of the business. So the successful actor must be tenacious.

A = Attitude. One of the surest ways to become an employed actor is to be the sort of performer that people love to work with. That's all about attitude. "I love acting. I'm talented" are not the phrases that are going to get you there. "What can I do to help?" is the key to the stage door. Committed actors who are eager to help put on a 'good show' do far better than cynical actors who are waiting for someone to give them a 'break.' Twas ever thus.

L = Legwork. Actors who send out their pictures and resumes and then sit around Starbucks waiting for the 'big call' ...eventually become cynical. Actors who spend every working day promoting, advertising, selling and building their acting BUSINESS, are the ones whose names end up on the marquee. In other words, it's mostly about doing the legwork, homework, and hard work (the boring, business part) – 24/7/365.

E = Entrepreneur. Actors who are willing to 'go into business' for themselves are actors who are destined to really succeed. Instead of waiting around for someone to 'approve' you – it's important to take the reins in your own hands and 'put on a show.' It's a proven path to stardom.

N = Nice. As anyone who reads my stuff knows, I'm convinced that 'nice' is one of the most important assets any actor can develop. Nice people just do better in the world of business. Why? Because we'd all prefer to spend our working day (about a third of our lives) in the company of nice people. I can say with great authority (after 40 years on

the boards and on the sound stages) that nice actors are much more successful than actors who are just talented. By the way, you can't fake nice – but you can act nice.

T = Travel. If you hate to travel, show business is a poor choice of occupation. There's no question that a successful acting career is going to REQUIRE you to travel to different places – because work rarely comes to you. "There's no work in Seattle (or Keokuk or Kalamazoo)" is just an excuse for not making progress in your career. The obvious answer to that situation is "Move! You are not a tree!" Successful actors go where the work is. One day it might be Chicago, the next it might be Vancouver, the next it might be Omaha. You have got to be willing to move (and move a lot) if you want to get to the red carpet eventually. Staying in one place makes forward progress in your career ... unlikely.

So, the next time you are told that you have talent – just remember it's not enough to get you where you want to go on its own ... and start developing your T.A.L.E.N.T. There is no shortcut to the red carpet – but there is a map.






The theater community has lost **H. Frank Catir**, one of the founders of **Lyric Music Theater**, which was organized back in 1953 as Portland Music Theater. Frank was the music director for many Lyric Theater shows including the debut KISS ME, KATE in February 1954, followed by CAROUSEL and H.M.S. PINAFORE in 1955, and SOUTH PACIFIC in 1956. Later he moved to California, where he was affiliated with the Pasadena Playhouse and Desilu Studios. On returning to Maine he again directed at Lyric Music Theater with productions like CAMELOT, which ran for an unprecedented 5 weeks in 1982. In 1989 he retired to Palm Harbor, Fl., and was active in various music organizations until he passed away at age 86 on Feb. 5, 2007.

The theater community has also lost **Norman M. Leger**, who guided the **New London Barn Playhouse** in New London, NH, for 50 years of its 75-year history as the oldest continuously operating summer theater in New Hampshire. Leger came to New London in 1951 and in 1955 became the owner/producer of the Playhouse, where he continued until taking *emeritus* status in 2004. He passed away Dec. 15, 2006.

Also lost is **Alison Read**, who passed away in Ohio on Feb. 23. A teacher of English and theater, she retired to Cape Elizabeth, ME, with her husband in 1984 and was involved with Lyric Music Theater and Portland Players in such plays as FIDDLER ON THE ROOF, ARSENIC AND OLD LACE, and BECKET. She was a devoted member of the Jane Austen Society and often wrote playlets based on Austen's works for entertainment at their meetings.

And we have lost baritone **Paul Guimont** on Mar. 16, age 85, who, besides working as a radio announcer for WCSH and WMTW-FM, performed for 20 years with Portland Players and was in at least 17 shows at Lyric Music Theater, including SOUTH PACIFIC, GUYS AND DOLLS, and DAMN YANKEES.
