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### THE (OXFORD) HILLS ARE ALIVE WITH THE SOUND OF THEATER!

"We have an unofficial motto that we absconded from Linda Sturdivant (with her blessing!), 'If we're not having fun, we're not doing it right!' " That's a quote from Norman Hutchins, president of **OHMPAA**, **Oxford Hills Music & Performing Arts Association**. He adds, "We are all volunteers with fulltime jobs, so, if OHMPAA is not fun and becomes 'work', something needs to change or no one is going to do it!"

Hutchins is in his second one-year term as president of the group. "The two things I'm not is an actor or musician," he continues, "although I was on stage doing lights and sound as Stanley in 1940'S RADIO HOUR. I started in theater work in high school doing light and sound. Since then I have become sort of a technical guru with OHMPAA, doing lights, sound, stage managing, set construction, poster design, and producing since 2002."

Kristen Searles is the vice president and an actor, producer, and the historian of OHMPAA. She passed on the information that the group was started about 25 years ago by Dan Allen and Shirli Allen Heald., although the first production was SPEAK EASY in 1985. Shirli is still involved, having directed their successful first young people's production in the summer of 2007: CINDERELLA'S GLASS SLIPPER.

I asked Norman Hutchins if there would be a follow-up to their first young people's play. He responded, "We do shows that are submitted to us by directors, which fit together in the season. The board feels the young adults are our future and that we need to get them involved early on so that they're interested when they grow up. So if a young adult production were submitted again, then my guess is we would strongly think about it."

Linda Sturdivant (mentioned above) has directed shows from Biddeford to Sebago Lake Village as well as in the Oxford Hills area. She writes, "I loved the time I was with OHMPAA. I was the board president for years. (I can't really remember how long. There was a point where I couldn't actually remember not being on the board in one capacity or another.) I still direct for them from time to time. It is a great group of people. I have always believed that in community theater, 'If you aren't having fun, you aren't doing it right.' [Ed. Note: also see above!] Some of the most fun I have ever had was working with OHMPAA, so we must have been doing something right.

"We never let the size of the stage (17' X 12'), the lack of technical equipment, or the complexity of the show stand in the way of doing a production we wanted to do: the Greased Lightning car, the front end of a '54 Desoto, for GREASE, was disassembled on the front lawn, brought up a steep narrow staircase, and reassembled in the theater; the mural for THE SECRET GARDEN was painted in my basement on individual sheets of luan because the theater isn't heated – we only had a

few weeks on the stage in warm weather before the show went up. The cast of THE MUSIC MAN was so large and there were so many costume changes that not everyone fit backstage. Changing costumes and getting ready for an entrance were as carefully rehearsed as the scenes!

"OHMPAA is community theater at its best. They do a production that everyone can be proud of by making the obstacles part of the fun of getting there!"

Other shows Linda has directed for Oxford include DON'T DRESS FOR DINNER, tick, tick ...BOOM, SWINGTIME CANTEEN, YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU, and A GRAND NIGHT FOR SINGING.

"OHMPAA is a non-profit organization dedicated to the presentation of quality entertainment on a regular basis featuring the talents of local residents, " reads the website. Norman Hutchins adds, "We also include 'Promoting and presenting the performing arts in the Oxford Hills.' "

The group has two venues that they use: one at Paris Hill Academy, where they began staging productions in 1990, and the other at the Norway Grange #45, which they began utilizing in 2002. OHMPAA expresses gratitude to "the Paris Hill Community Club and the Norway Grange members for allowing them unrestricted access to the facilities, providing the luxury of flexible rehearsal schedules, storage space, and time to build and

nurture many spectacular sets, adding immeasurably to the quality of a production."

Sally Jones, teacher of drama and journalism part time at Oxford Hills High School, is another regular with this group. As an actor she has been on stage with them in RUMORS, NUNSENSE (the Mother Superior, twice, in 1994 and 2000), and elsewhere in STEEL MAGNOLIAS (as Ouiser at the Schoolhouse Arts Center). Since retiring from full-time teaching she has directed for OHMPAA plays that include SOMETHING'S AFOOT, THE FOREIGNER, THE ODD COUPLE, and will direct MAN OF LA MANCHA this coming fall. She also frequently does the publicity.

"OHMPAA is a very special group of wonderful people, " says Sally. "We try our very best to produce good theater. We have a pool of really great people, not only actors, but experienced and qualified directors and set designers including one who has designed 24 shows with us (not easy since we use two small stages in historical buildings, yet every set is different), and board members who not only pitch in to produce shows but who have composed a notebook of job descriptions for each member of a production team – all part of OHMPAA's great approach to everything! Besides all that, it's fun!"

Street, Norway. Board member Tom Littlefield directs. Says Tom, "I have a love for the classics and want to keep them alive in a time when the past is more and more rapidly being left behind and forgotten. I've wanted to direct this play since I first saw it in the early 70's at the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I was stunned, it was so wonderful. I lost myself completely. Each character is so exquisitely drawn – the pain and passion of each one is as real and relevant today as when it was written. It's theater at its best."

Other shows directed by Tom for OHMPAA include THE FANTASTICKS, OUR TOWN, AND THEN THERE WERE NONE, and ARSENIC AND OLD LACE. "I've been involved with OHMPAA on and off since the early 90's. As an actor I've been fortunate to do roles both large and small from Grandpa in YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU and Archie in THE SECRET GARDEN (with my own son, Zachery, as Archie's son Colin) to Erronius in FORUM. I have not gotten every role I went after, and I think that's as it should be, because we have a lot of talent in this area, just as good as I may think I am!

"As a board member, I am pleased to be involved with a group that has relatively few personality conflicts and is willing to do the work necessary to produce a high level of production. We have grown tremendously as an organization and have, I think, put together a foundation that will allow us to continue moving forward, providing our area with a quality theatrical experience.

"This area is also blessed by the presence of **Deertrees Theatre** as well as **The Celebration Barn**, run by Amanda Houtari. We are also lucky to have the **Oddfellow Theater** just over the mountain in Buckfield."

In celebration of OHMPAA's production of THE GLASS MENAGERIE, a collection of Norway organizations banded together in a series of activities called "The Menagerie Project." The first event, Memory Night, was March 19 at the Norway Historical Society, when anyone who has seen a show, wants to see a show, or has participated in any OHMPAA show was invited to come and share memories, memorabilia and refreshments. The second event was April 2 when the public was invited to the Norway Grange for an introduction to the play featuring the cast in brief scenes and a discussion of the show with the cast, the director, and producers Elton Cole and Shelly Shibles.

The third event will be April 8 at 7 pm at Norway Memorial Library with a talk about the playwright by Christopher Schario,

Artistic Director of **The Public Theatre** in Lewiston. In addition to the lecture, Zhenya and Schelene Shevchenko from Galicia Glassworks in Gray will display their handblown, colorful glass animal figurines that can also be purchased. Then on April 12, Café Nomad will present A Night of Jazz with jazz from the 1930's as featured in the play. And up and down Main Street, Norway businesses are exhibiting displays about the play and "The Menagerie Project," and Books-N-Things has books for purchase by and about Tennessee Williams.

Those in the cast of THE GLASS MENAGERIE are Leah Haney as Laura, Scott Maddix as her brother, Tom, Kathy Davis as her mother, Amanda, and Daniel Rennie as Jim, the gentleman caller. In addition to the director and producers named above, the production team includes Claire Sessions, set designer; Kayla Newmeyer, stage manager; and Sally Jones, publicity chair.

On April 15 English and drama classes are invited to see the show free of charge and meet the cast afterwards for discussion. The April 17 performance will be a benefit for Responsible Pet Care, free with a donation of food, supplies, or cash that can be used for the animals. Other performances will be at 8 pm on April 18, 19, and 24 - 26, and at 2 pm on April 20, 26, and 27. Tickets at Books-N-Things – call (207) 739-6200.

I asked what Hutchins sees for the future of this group. He said, "The board has put together the following goals for 2008: Grange Building improvements, working towards 501©3 status; putting together a *How to Audition* class, updated signage – Banner & Sandwich board, and improving our *Producer's Notebook*."

In closing, Norman Hutchins says, "OHMPAA is a fantastic family that works well together to make wonderful and affordable productions that continue to entertain and impress our audiences again and again. I am proud to be part of the excitement and can't wait to see where we're headed. I think there are big things in our future!"

The Center Theatre's Executive Director Patrick Myers writes, "The newly renovated Center Theatre for the Performing Arts is the only professional performing space in Piscataquis County. The 300-seat auditorium plays host to a wide range of activities each month from movie to live theater to concerts to community events. 2008 marks the second fullyear of operation for the Theatre and the third year for our resident community theater group The Slightly Off-Center Players."

### WENDY POOLE & CHRIS PRICE MARRIED TO THE THEATER & MARRIED IN THE THEATER

In the fall of 1994 I was in rehearsal for Brendan Behan's THE HOSTAGE at **The Theater Project** in Brunswick. Before making the fifty mile round trip I would stop at the corner of Brackett and Pine Streets to give a ride to Wendy Poole, who played a small non-speaking role as a prostitute. Today she is the executive director of The Theater Project, with the goal of continuing the work begun by the theater's founder, Al Miller, 36 years ago. She is responsible for overseeing the business end of the theater with a goal of filling the 88-seat venue with patrons. It's a job that still requires her to commute from Portland's West End, where she lives with her husband, director and actor Chris Price (and two cats Kiwi and Moxie). Both of them were home one Sunday evening in February after driving back from Brunswick where they were performing in The Theater Project's *Winter Cabaret*.

Wendy Poole moved to Maine from New York in 1992 and she still has her Long Island, New York, area code on her cell phone number! "I was in New York working," she said, "or looking for work. I was bartending. A good friend of mine from Maine called me and said I should move up here and that there was a lot of theater in Maine, which made me chuckle 'cause I was living in Manhattan."

After spending a summer in Maine, she attended the combined theater auditions that were being held at the Portland Performing Arts Center. "I got calls from The Theater Project, The Portland Stage Company Grass Roots Project, The Originals in Bar Mills, and The Mad Horse Theatre Company."

PSC's Grass Roots Project cast her in an all female version of Sam Shepard's, TRUE WEST. "It was one of my favorite experiences. We rehearsed at midnight, had to find our own costumes and get the lines learned quickly."

Chris Price, whose undergraduate degree was in English, was living in Boston in the late 1970's .He came to Maine for job interviews with *The Maine Times* and *The Times Record*. "I didn't get either job," he said. "But I hung around Maine and got a job as a teacher at the old Shelter Institute. I've always been good thinking on my feet, which happens a lot in Maine!"

"You just take what you get", interjected Wendy.

"When I was teaching (at the Shelter Institute)," Chris continued, " one of my students, Nat Warren-White, was casting a play at The Theater Project. He cast me in TRIFLES, a one-act play by Susan Glaspell. It was part of an evening of three-one act plays staged at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Brunswick. I played a cop. That got me back into theater."

Chris went back to the Boston area and attended graduate school at the Harvard School of Design. He also took theater courses at the American Repertory Theatre in Cambridge. Returning to Maine, he worked with The Theater Project as an actor, director and scenic designer. He also appeared in numerous roles with The Vintage Repertory Company and The Mad Horse Theatre Company.

Chris first met Wendy at an audition for The Theater Project's production of Ariel Dorfman's DEATH AND THE MAIDEN, which he was directing. "I was still a wide eyed bushy-tailed actress, still nervous and naïve," said Wendy.

"But I didn't cast her," commented Chris. "I didn't use her for a while. But I said to Al Miller, 'That Wendy seems pretty organized. Why don't you hire her as production manager?' After that we worked a lot together."

"Then Al Miller cast me in Peter Barnes' THE RED NOSES," said Wendy. " I think it was Paula Vogel's HOW I LEARNED TO DRIVE when Chris first cast me in a role."

Chris and Wendy were married at The Theater Project in 2006. "Al married us," said Wendy. "He became a Notary Public just for the occasion. We ran the wedding just like a play. There was less stress; we knew what we were doing. Chris designed the set, J.P. Gagnon did our lights and sound, and Jen Roe made the costumes (wedding clothes) and supplied the props!"

Chris's daughter Rowan, from a first marriage, was part of the ceremony as "Best Daughter".

"We could only invite 80 people," said Wendy, " because that is the number of seats in the theater."

Wendy is the first executive director the theater has had in its 36 years. She credits Al Miller for his perseverance all those years building the theater to what it is today. "I feel so strongly about what we have done with the kids and adults at the theater," she said. "The kids and community people who take classes at the theater also help us with fund raising, ushering and apprenticing for our productions. The Theater Project becomes their family."

"They play a big role in the theater and take part in the productions," agreed Chris.

"Al has made this the best children's theater in New England,"

added Wendy. "All I'm doing now is continuing what Al started because I believe in it so much."

In March The Theater Project presented The Young People's Theater performing HAROUN AND THE SEA OF STORIES adapted by Al Miller. Chris Price will direct the professional ensemble in STEEL MAGNOLIAS by Robert Harling running May 2-18. Call (207) 729-8584.

### TWO OPERA REVIEWS & TIPS ON WHAT TO DO WITH YOUR HANDS By Julie Goell

MANON LESCAUT by Giacomo Puccini, Metropolitan Opera, February 16

Bravo to the Met for this first rate production and for the visionary HD videocast, which enables us to get right up close in faraway Maine.

(Finnish soprano) Karita Matilla's performance was wellcrafted, specifically her arc from innocence to ruination. She gave a superbly inappropriate and goofy interview in which she demonstrated the splits coming up in the second act, thereby raising the bar for flexibility and opera singing! Matilla's climactic high notes were on the edge of screaming and this is where producing real emotion might get in the way of good technique. A debate for another time perhaps. Marcello Giordani as the hapless lover, Des Grieux, is a great singer, lovable performer, and believable actor. Conductor James Levine is my absolute hero. The camera cuts in close at the top of each act as he sets up the mood and pacing. It is a chance to witness true genius.

Dale Travis as the lecherous old Geronte is a fine singer but mugs too much. He looks the part and doesn't need to sell it, too. Just think the thoughts.

You have to wonder what motivates Manon's brother, Lescaut, to sell her off and then play yoyo with his sister. And in the light of modern sensibilities, one wonders why Manon is completely at the effect of decisions made by the three men in her life. This issue should challenge a director the most in remaking the piece for a contemporary audience.

**LA RONDINE** by Giacomo Puccini, San Francisco Opera November production, March 9

Gorgeous production, a design team from heaven (Italy actually: design genius Ezio Frigerio), beautiful singing, nice direction.

Watch this clip of (Roumanian soprano) Angela Gheorghiu as Magda to see what **not** to do with your hands: <u>http://sfopera.com/opera.asp?o=255</u> Gheorghiu produces a richly calculated sound, but with more tension than anyone should need onstage. As Lisette, Anna Christy is wonderfully comic and vocally limpid. Christy is funny because her frustrations are believable. The oracle predicts: a rising star.

Ruggero Lastouc: Misha Didyk is a lovely tenor with a sweet quality.

#### **On Using Your Hands**:

Singing takes total focus, so, when not sure what to do with wayward arms, why fight gravity? Try to relax them at your side or on your lap, rather than wave them around randomly. You shouldn't be thinking about "arm choreography." If you need to open your chest and armpits, justify the move emotionally. Don't touch or caress yourself to indicate emotion. It comes off as really self-indulgent. With all due respect to Renee Fleming, her use of stylized arm waving and faux-fretting undercuts the suspension of disbelief. Focus on your sound and on what you (the character) are thinking, which **results** in the next phrase. The arms will take care of themselves. If they don't, call me for help (207) 766-2945.

#### Awareness Exercises for Hands:

- 1) <u>Emotion</u>: Practice extending feeling an emotion right through to your fingertips anger, love, fear, desire, etc.
- <u>Sensation</u>: Practice using all arm and finger joints as conductors – begin a physical sensation at the center of your back and send it through one arm at a time – pleasure, heat, cold, disgust, pain, etc.
- 3) <u>To become more aware</u> of how you use your hands, spread a little honey on the back of your hand and fingers, then go about some household chores.




