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EVERYMAN REPERTORY THEATRE

How did an Englishman, who also has Scottish and Welsh heritage, come to be the Artistic Director of a new theater company in Maine?

"My wife is American," said Paul Hodgson, "and after 16 years in the UK she said it was time to come home. Being from Connecticut she had no wish to return there unless in a time warp, so we tried to find somewhere in America that combined the atmosphere of Connecticut in the 1970's and the perennial beauty of the English Lake District. We found that in Camden, Maine, and moved."

And how did you meet your wife?


"I was brought up in the Lake District and when I went off to do a Master's degree in acting, I met Jen at the Welsh College of Music and Drama in Cardiff, where, as one of the two Americans on the course, she was teased mercilessly until ... the arrival of a German student! We've been together – despite the best efforts of our respective immigration administrations – ever since."

What brought you into the theater in the first place?

"I did a little acting growing up, waiting for the shadow of older students to disperse before taking to the stage at school as Truffaldino in THE SERVANT OF TWO MASTERS, and then Malvolio in TWELFTH NIGHT. Then I gave it all up again at Durham University where I was studying English Literature because I couldn't bear the students who were in the drama groups. Later I did a lot of work in my hometown for various amateur groups and for directors at Lancaster University (just down the road) before going off to Wales. But everyone in my family acted - Dad, Mum, brother, sister - in fact, at our last family reunion my brother organized one of those murder mystery evenings just so we could all show off! I'm the only one to have gone professional though. That started with a stint at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival right after college where, with the optimism of the young, we took 7 shows to a single Prince's Street venue, starting performances at 10 am with a children's show, continuing all day, and finishing with an 11 pm performance of HUIS CLOS by Sartre. My wife and I were in 4 shows every day. At the end of it we'd made enough money to pay off our loan and buy a Chinese meal for the 15-strong crew. After that we moved to London and worked in touring theater, in television, radio and film in the 80's."

And how did Everyman Rep come about?

"We had both given up acting for about 15 years until moving to Camden where we met John Berstein (he played Slim Goodbody on the Captain Kangaroo TV show and is a resident of Lincolnville, ME), and he hired us to do voiceover work for some cartoons. Then I did a two-man show with him at the Camden Opera House, and then I was cast in the comic speaking role of Frosch in Maine Grand Opera's production of DIE FLEDERMAUS, for which I wrote a monologue about our particular local *bete noir* at the time – MBNA. That got me noticed by playwright Robert Manns, who cast Jen and me in the premiere of his play THE SWAN WHO SLEPT. After that the three of us and a group of other theater pros spent three years kicking around the idea of starting up a professional theater company based here until we finally got enough energy and expertise together in 2008 to appoint a board, write a business plan, and get 501(3)c status. I got appointed artistic director because, well, to be honest, no one else wanted the job, and sometimes I know just exactly why!"

The other founding members, besides Paul and Jennifer Hodgson and Robert Manns, are Dean Jorgenson, Carole Leporati, Edith Manns, David Renier, and Marian Swan. In addition to those, others in the core company include Ann Foskett, Ashley St. Pierre, David Troup, actors; Rebecca Gross, stage manager; and designers/tech staff Ken Barnes, Nick

Belley, Molly White, and Alan Hall.

What is the history of the company to this point?

"In October 2008, the first major production of Everyman Repertory Theatre (ERT) was Noel Coward's PRIVATE LIVES at the Rockport Opera House. It was well received with large audiences for both weekends. In keeping with ERT's mission to make professional theater accessible to local residents, we offered tickets for the opening night at \$1.00 per person. This price was set in accordance with the prevailing theater ticket prices during the Great Depression in the 1930's, the date of the play's premiere on Broadway, as well as to recognize the onset of the current recession. The gesture created enormous good will for the company within the community. That first night we packed the Opera House with about 350 people, and as we came upstairs from the green room, the roar and heat of the crowd was at a level I hadn't experienced since being backstage with my wife just before she sang in front of a 2,000 strong audience for a BBC show called Friday Night is Music Night! That feeling is why we do this, and the good will we generate by reducing ticket prices for at least one night in each run of all our main stage shows is the sort of thing that will, we hope, establish us as a fixture! ERT continued its success in 2009 with A. R. Gurney's LOVE LETTERS in collaboration with local inns and hotels to create a vacation package over Valentine's Day Weekend. The Maine premiere, of Edward Albee's OCCUPANT, his new play about Rockland sculptress Louise Nevelson, was mounted as part of the Farnsworth Art Museum's Maine in America celebrations. The final production in 2009 was Patrick Hamilton's GASLIGHT, which extended both ERT's range while continuing to grow audiences. The 2009-10 season opened with a triumphant revival of Kaufman & Hart's THE MAN WHO CAME TO DINNER, which doubled previous attendance numbers at the Rockport Opera House."

ERT's 2010 season has continued with a staged reading of Edna St. Vincent Millay's verse play CONVERSATION AT MIDNIGHT, which has been touring throughout March at such venues as the Farnsworth Art Museum, the Camden Library, the Skidompha Library in Damariscotta, the Hutchinson Center in Belfast, and the Unity College Center for the Performing Arts. The production is supported by a grant from The Maine Humanities Council and the Maine Arts Commission. [The troupe hopes that a summer show of the play can be arranged with the Whitehorse Inn in Camden (closed in the winter), given Millay's association with the inn.] In the cast are David Troup (also director), Ken Barnes, Hal Owen, Dean Jorgenson, Jennifer Hodgson, Scott Smith, and Paul Hodgson.

What's next?

"In May we are doing a new adaptation of THE MISER by Moliere, which we are not only presenting at our main venue here, the Rockport Opera House, but will also tour area high schools, including Camden, Rockland, Belfast, etc. for students studying French, English Literature, and Drama. We are planning to do a couple of short scenes in French, and, if we're lucky, we're also hoping to do it at the Franco-American Heritage Center in Lewiston. It seems totally appropriate. This is the first in what I hope will be a series of *Drama in Schools* events, where we perform a classic of the theater, from the 20th century to classical Greek drama, as one of the plays in our season and take it into schools. This is going to be a bit challenging to schedule as we all have day jobs and, of course, schools want the performance during the school day. We are working very hard to resolve this, since I think it is very important for us to take professional theater and show it to young audiences.

"Our next season will consist of THE 39 STEPS, based on John Buchan's spy novel-- it's just come off Broadway and we just heard we have the rights for it; a tour of A. R. Gurney's LOVE LETTERS; and another *Drama in Schools* show which has yet to be decided – so any English teachers out there, send me your suggestions!"

As we are getting ready for our final layout and printing, Everyman Rep has received word that the Davis Family Foundation has awarded the company a \$10,000 grant in support of their *Drama in Schools* project and their inaugural production of THE MISER. Cast & Crew

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SANDRA DUTTON: Playwright, Novelist, Painter

"Storytelling was prized at our house, " says Sandra Dutton in her bio. "At the dinner table my two sisters and I would recount the eccentricities of our teachers, sometimes pushing off from the table to demonstrate a walk or a gesture. My mother, an especially good mimic, would join in with stories from her office, where she was head of personnel, letting her glasses drop for one speaker, pushing them up for another, altering her voice as she described the daily affairs. We all thought her office must be the most exciting place in the world. My sister Jane spent a day at work with her, but when she came home she whispered, 'Nothing happens.' We all realized it was in the telling."

But young Sandra had another influence in her life. "Like my dad, I have a passion for words and pictures. One of my fondest memories is sitting with him at the kitchen table drawing. I remember making a man in a hat. Like most children I drew the hat like a cake on a platter, but he showed me how the hat rests down over the ears. I was about four and felt very grownup when he told me that. Another lesson involved drawing the house behind us. I was caught up in drawing every shingle, wondering how I would ever finish. 'You should suggest,' said my dad. He showed me how a few horizontals attached to short verticals could imply an entire wall. Magical."

The musical JUST A MATTER OF TIME, with book and lyrics by Ms. Dutton and music by Jack Kohl, had an Equity showcase production at the Sage Theatre in NYC in January 2007 and then received its New England premiere at the Boothbay Playhouse on Rte. 27 in Boothbay, ME, in August of that year. Susan Streater directed and choreographed this story of 11-year-old Meg, who is accused of losing her curiosity and is sent on a quest to find Time. Meg discovers that time is more than minutes on a clock – that it can be begged or borrowed, stolen or squandered, and that if she is to make the most of her own time, she must follow her curiosity.

Now living with her husband in Maine, Sandra Dutton was born in Missouri and grew up in Ohio, the daughter of parents who were also Sunday school teachers. An art major in college with a BA in Fine Arts followed later by a Ph.D. in Rhetoric & Composition, her work history includes designing clothes in San Francisco; teaching both art and writing at the elementary, high school, and university level; reviewing for the New York Times Book Review; and chairing the English Department at New York Institute of Technology. As a painter, she has exhibited at the Maine Art Gallery in Wiscasset, the University of Southern Maine at Lewiston, and the University of New England.

Her five published books for children include DEAR MISS PER-FECT: A BEAST'S GUIDE TO PROPER BEHAVIOR and will be joined this spring by a sixth: MARY MAE AND THE GOSPEL TRUTH. In addition she has written a puppet play/musical in three parts, based on part of the book. This was scheduled to be produced in Louisville but has been postponed because the economy caused a reduction in grant money. However, it can be seen at <u>www.MaryMaeandtheGospelTruth.com</u> under 'Pages.' This is the puppet show that Mary Mae and her friends put on in the book. "Except for NOAH'S ARK," says Ms. Dutton, "most of it is not in the book, but I thought it might be fun to read or act out. Orlin, the preacher's son, plays God in 'Creation.' He's a little full of himself and likes booming out 'GOOD, VERY VERY GOOD.' He's also fond of Bible words like 'firmament' and 'without form and void.'

"In the third play, Mary Mae plays Mrs. Noah. She surprises everyone with her understanding of the problems Noah's Ark would have had, and wonders where they're going to keep the insects and how they're going to keep such a huge boat clean! I wrote MARY MAE AND THE GOSPEL TRUTH for kids like me who love discovering things, whether in the Bible, the backyard, or a history book. I want them to have the courage to ask questions."

ANDY DAVIS, FILMMAKER

"In 1937 a young deaf girl was abandoned in the middle of nowhere by her parents....."

This is the tag line for a trailer of local filmmaker Andy Davis's new film ADELLE. The film is a horror film. Its theme of abandonment is one of Davis's childhood fears. He is currently editing the film at The Maine Studios on Presumpscot Street. When you walk into his office, the first thing you notice is a poster for the film LAST HOUSE ON THE LEFT (the remake) hanging on the wall.

Davis grew up in Porter, Maine, and became a fan of horror movies at age seven. He watched THE TEXAS CHAIN SAW MASSACRE and CREEPSHOW. "I was 14 when I rented THE LAST HOUSE ON THE LEFT," says Davis. "I made a pirate copy of it."

He feels it may seem like a weird thing to be "into." But he realized that people who are naturally afraid of things make the best horror movies and his fear has always been abandonment.

"You look back at Alfred Hitchcock," says Davis, "that guy was scared of everything. As a young child his father had a policeman friend put him in jail as a little joke, but Hitchcock really thought he was going to jail. Another example of a horror icon that is frightened of everything is Stephen King. He has stated he cannot sleep in a bed where his feet hang over the edge for fear of something grabbing his feet."

Davis started working on films when he attended Sacopee Valley High School. The school didn't have a video camera so Davis and a buddy pooled their money and bought one. His first job was working at Captain Cutler's Haunted Mansion in Funtown. The "Mansion" offered shocks to customers brave enough to go all the way through it. The scare came primarily from not knowing what to expect in the dark. The "Mansion" was torn down years ago.

"I explore abandoned insane asylums," says Davis. "I feel my way around through the tunnels and mazes. There is one down in Danvers, but it is now condos. That's the kind of thing I do to get my scares."

After he graduated high school he made a short film called TV NATION. Then he attended college in Pittsburgh between 1995 and 1997. "I moved to Pittsburgh," he says, "because that was where all the NIGHT OF THE LIVING DEAD films were made. I got to meet and work with some of the people I had been watching."

He returned to Maine and worked with Olin Smith at offices in the Back Bay Tower on Cumberland Avenue in Portland. "Olin took me under his wing and taught me almost everything I need to know about commercial video." Smith, who is today partnered with Davis at Abandon Films, says that Davis came to him wanting to learn all about the production business and Davis never said no to anything.

At this point in his career Davis had made eight short films. He staged a multi-media event at the Fine Arts Cinema. (For most of the 70's until the tail end of the 90's, The Fine Arts Cinema was a hard core porn movie house, but in the late 90's it became a performance space and is now Geno's.) "We were the first people to do crazy performance art there," says Davis. "It was called the Robot Freak Show. We showed our films and we had a band. They would play in between the films. There were people dressed like robots, not on stage, but in the audience. Outside there were robots walking around with guns. When you bought a ticket, a guy would ask for the last four digits of your social security number and would write it on a sticker so it would read 'My name is...' followed by four numbers. The robots would take you to your seat in the theater. We did a stage performance and had people planted in the audience with (fake) guns with CO2 cartridges that would make a gun noise. We also had some live video feed from an upstairs room."

Davis feels that in the late '90's the Back Bay Tower studio was a great incubator for local film talent. "Kyle (Rankin) and Efram (Potelle) were down there making stuff happen before anyone else was. It was a creative space. Olin was there, Reggie Groff, Richard Searls, Robert Barnes and Lou Carroll and they were all making stuff happen." Kyle and Efram auditioned actors for their short film PENNYWEIGHT at the studios there. After spending a year at the Back Bay Tower studio, Davis returned to Pennsylvania and changed his major from special effects to video production. But then -- "I returned to Maine again," he said. "I had a baby boy, and I started a new company called Empty House Films. I made three good short films that went around to different festivals, all on the theme of backwoods horror."

After those films were distributed he teamed up with his mentor Olin Smith and made a feature length film that he had been working on for five years, titled MUD. "It was about my childhood," says Davis. "I started writing it as a child. I finished it as a father. It changed the dynamic of my thinking about the father (in the script). It was all a one-sided view: the child's view." The film was released in 2005 and has been screened in Portland and Ellsworth, Maine.

Featured in the film ADELLE are local actors Leo Lunser and Tim Ryan (who had a small role in EMPIRE FALLS). Madeline McNulty, who was featured in MUD, is also in the film. "Madeline later appeared in THE PRIVATE LIVES OF PIPPA LEE, which was directed by Rebecca Miller, playwright Arthur Miller's daughter," says Davis. "She spent 20 days working on that." The film stared Robin Wright-Penn, Alan Arkin and Wynona Ryder and was released in 2009. McNulty played the title character at age seven.

In ADELLE McNulty also plays the title character, the young deaf girl dropped off in the middle of nowhere by her father. ADELLE is co-written by Sandy McKeon, who plays a small role in the film. "It's being distributed by the company that distributes the NIGHT OF THE LIVING DEAD and THE TEXAS CHAINSAW MASSACRE," says Davis. "So you see I've come full circle!"

Brian made his childhood stage debut in OLIVER at City Theater in 1984 and went on to become a professional musician, music director (many seasons at Maine State Music Theatre), and composer whose music and/or arrangements have been heard in various theaters around the country; one of his musicals, THE SPIRIT OF REINDEER, was performed at USM under Ed Reichert's direction in 2007. Eve also loved her family and often said how blessed she was with her husband, children and their spouses, and grandchildren. We offer them our sympathy. She will be greatly missed.

ADVICE FROM MERYL STREEP

As promised, here are some great tidbits of advice from one of the greatest actors of our time ... Meryl Streep. I hope you 'listen.'

Acting is not about being someone different. It's finding the similarity in what is apparently different, then finding myself in there.

All an actor has is their blind faith that they are who they say they are today, in any scene.

Everything we say signifies; everything counts - that we put out into the world. It impacts on kids, it impacts on the *zeitgeist* of the time.

Expensive clothes are a waste of money.

How you first meet the public is how the industry sees you. You can't argue with them - that's their perception.

I choose to work on things that put a positive energy out, because otherwise I don't know why I am alive.

I have to start out with nothing each time - and reinvent the wheel. It's very, very hard.

I think the most liberating thing I did early on was to free myself from any concern with my looks, as they pertained to my work.

I think this is a kind of career path that demands a certain thing ... that not everybody wants to give.

I think your self emerges more clearly over time.

I was just interested in making a human being as contradictory and messy as we all are.

I'm curious about other people. That's the essence of my acting. I'm interested in what it would be like to be you.

If I am not confident that I can portray the character perfectly on screen, I won't even try.

Instant gratification is not soon enough.

Integrate what you believe in every single area of your life. Take your heart to work and ask the most and best of everybody else, too.

My attitude is, Why not try this? So I go from thing to thing like any actor does, with my little bag and my dopp kit.

My feeling about fears is, if you voice your fears, they may come true. I'm superstitious enough to believe that.

The great gift of human beings is that we have the power of empathy.

The more you are in this business, the more humbled by it you become.

I think these remarks go a long way to explaining why Meryl Streep is successful - and why her acting is almost universally praised.

I hope you found one or two ideas you can apply to your own career.

Employing mechanical engineering, magic realism, and a little Abbot & Costello, the play is a meditation on invention, betrayal, and memory.
