THE ORIGINALS - STILL TOGETHER!!

For the December 1994 issue, Cast & Crew co-founder Greg Titherington wrote an article about Dana Packard and Jennifer Porter with the title: *Couple Stays Together; Now That's Original*, referring to the fact that many theater people have short-lived relationships while these two were getting ready to celebrate their sixth wedding anniversary. Well, they're still a team and since their careers in theater (**The Originals**) and film (**Honeytree Films**) have continued to expand, it seems like a good time to visit them again after more than 17 years!

From that earlier article I gather that you are both Maine natives. Would you recap for our subscribers how you got together?

Dana: Jennifer and I are indeed Maine natives. We met at the Maine High School One-Act Play Festival in 1984 – she with Windham, I with Bonny Eagle (Standish). Not long after that, Jennifer called me and asked me to go to the movies – something completely out of character for her at the time.

Jennifer: But I was smitten!

Dana: Lucky me! I took two years off to wait for her, bussing tables and teaching Karate and skiing, and then we went to UM in Orono. I majored in Theater and Jennifer majored in Music Performance. We started The Originals in the summer of 1988, while we were still in school, and moved into the Saco River Grange Hall in 1990.

And how did that happen with the Saco River Grange Hall and how has that facility worked for you?

Dana: The Saco River Grange Hall is less than a mile from where I grew up, but I never really knew it was there or paid attention to it when I was young. It was built as a Universalist Church in 1897 and was a theater (The Riverside Theatre) for a while in the 20's and 30's showing silent movies and with plays presumably performed. Then for many years it was an actual Grange Hall. Sometime in the 1980's the Grange sold the building to an auctioneer for (legend has it) \$1,000, and it was a popular auction house until 1988. I became aware of the building in 1989 just as a developer from Massachusetts was buying it from the auctioneer for a somewhat higher, but still ridiculously low, price. My mother, who has a history of rescuing and renovating old buildings, was aware of the pending sale and asked the realtor to keep her in the loop. The developer wanted it for a residence, and he was running into challenges from the Saco River Corridor and town ordinances. My mom had arts-presenting dreams of her own, and Jennifer and I were exploring the building and thinking it would be the perfect home base for our theater company. We were all hoping the deal would fall through with the developer, but it did not. He bought the building and owned it long enough to do some construction work on the basement before deciding it was not worth the

trouble. He called my mother to see if she still wanted "the G.D. building" and she scooped it up basically for the original price, plus covering him for the work on the basement! Thus began what has become a family business of sorts. The Saco River Grange Hall officially opened as a cultural arts center on Earth Day of 1990. In 1993 SRGH incorporated as a 501©3 non-profit organization. Since the venue's opening my folks have handled a steady, busy schedule of concerts, dances, art shows, and various other events, and The Originals has been the full-time resident company, having now produced over 65 plays and musicals. We've been lucky to have an audience that accepts basically everything we offer them, from lighthearted comedy to very challenging material. We've done productions ranging from HAIR (3 times) to A STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE to EXTREMITIES to FLAMING GUNS OF THE PURPLE SAGE. Our mailing list is now over 4,000 strong. We are in a unique location that draws audiences from every direction. Bar Mills is a very small town, but it is a half-hour drive from Kennebunk, Saco, Biddeford, Scarborough, Gorham, Portland, South Portland, Sanford, and Windham! audiences come from all those towns, and also from much further afield.

I understand you started with mainly musicals and gradually have worked in the addition of drama and comedy – how is that working?

Dana & Jennifer: Our first two shows were musicals (in 1988 and 1989), but since then we have produced twice as many straight plays as musicals. In general, straight plays sell nearly as well for us, and of course tend to be cheaper to produce. Our formula, if we have one, is to try to produce a wide range of

material. We do a lot of Maine premieres, and our audiences have come to expect the unexpected from us.

Dana: Some of my fondest memories are of musicals, though. I remember feeling that we had done something really exceptional with HAIR, and I felt the same a few years ago with MAN OF LA MANCHA. Jennifer's music direction and choreography bring out great things in people, and when the combinations are just right, something really breathtaking takes place. From time to time there have been performances of plays that have seemed to transcend time and space and have been really meaningful, too. The opening night of FOOL FOR LOVE when no one clapped or moved at the end for what seemed like an eternity, before jumping to their feet all at once ... one of the nights of SILENCE, where it felt like something, well - sacred, for lack of a better word, was going on ...the of LITTLE EGYPT, the tenderness magic ELEEMOSYNARY, and others. For me it's the possibility of those experiences that keeps me coming back.

Jennifer: Some of the most memorable moments for me also were the 3 summers we did HAIR. The theater was packed with audience members leaning forward, resting elbows on the stage, and every night they would rush the stage after the curtain call, and the cast and audience would have an extended 10-minute impromptu dance party. COYOTE UGLY was also thrilling, as you could visibly see audience members knocked back into their seats by the power of the play. The author, Lynn Siefert, is one of my favorite writers and actually liked my writing enough to have me turn her play LITTLE EGYPT (another of my favorites) into a screenplay. When it comes to deciding favorite shows, I have to divide them into musicals and straight plays because the experience of each is so different for me. So, for musicals my top three would be MAN OF LA MANCHA, HAIR, and WORKING, and for straight plays (which I greatly prefer to musicals!) my top three would be COYOTE UGLY. THE WOOLGATHERER, and THE LUCKY SPOT.

How did you get started working on films and then making your own?

Dana: I joined SAG in 1991 and Jennifer joined in 1994 – each of us having benefited from being cast in speaking roles in Stephen King movies (GRAVEYARD SHIFT and THE LANGOLIERS, respectively). So there was union work for both of us (mostly in Boston) in the form of bit parts in film and TV, commercials, industrials, and student films during the 90's. In 1998 Jennifer suggested that we start our own film company, on the model of The Originals. I thought it was her best idea yet - and she has a lot of good ones! So, with the generous monetary support of fans of The Originals, we shot our first film that November, a 16mm short that I wrote called THE BALLAD OF IDA AND DOOB. Jennifer, William McDonough III, Nancy Davis, and the late P. Michael Bourgoin starred, and Jennifer wrote and performed the film score. I directed and edited. The movie premiered in Saratoga Springs in March 1999 and went on to a nice festival run.

In the meantime, Jennifer began writing full-length screenplays, which were exceptional, and right away caught the interest of some great actors and their agents. In summer 2002 we filmed MR. BARRINGTON. I produced, directed, and edited, and managed to convince the Directors Guild of America to include me in their ranks. Jennifer wrote the screenplay, composed and performed the score, and starred in the film with Brian

McCardie (ROB ROY, 200 CIGARETTES), Eric Schweig (LAST OF THE MOHICANS, THE MISSING), and Jonelle Allen (DR. QUINN MEDICINE WOMAN, THE HOTEL NEW HAMPSHIRE). Several Originals actors appeared in the movie including C. James Roberts, William McDonough III, and Nancy Davis. MR. BARRINGTON, too, had a small festival run and has gone on to respectable domestic and foreign distribution. It has been translated into various languages including Serbian (!) and appears in various media in the UK, Eastern Europe, Canada, and very recently, Vietnam and China.

In 2010 we filmed Jennifer's newest screenplay, 40 WEST, primarily on a set built in the Saco River Grange Hall. While we were shooting the film, the Writers Guild of America invited Jennifer to join their union. So, between these and Actors Equity, it's fair to say that we are well protected these days! Once again, I produced, directed, and edited, and Jennifer wrote the screenplay, composed the score, and starred, with Brian A. White, the late Scott Winters, Maine's Kathleen Kimball, and legendary entertainer Wayne Newton. Several local actors appeared in 40 WEST including Rob Cameron, Dylan Chestnutt, Michael Kimball, William McDonough III, and C. James Roberts.

40 WEST has had an auspicious start with good reviews and quite a bit of acclaim. Since its premiere in New York City in October 2011, the movie has won or been nominated for 15 awards. We hope this good fortune will continue! On June 2, 2012, we will have a DVD release party at the Saco River Grange Hall. At the event we will screen a documentary by Dan Wood on the making of 40 WEST. A CD of Jennifer's music from the film will be available there, too.

How do you select your stage plays?

Jennifer: I read somewhere around 40 plays a year and whittle them down to the five or so that I'm either interested in doing, or I think have parts some of our actors would excel in, or I think our audiences would like. Dana then reads these, and we talk about them and make our decisions together.

How do you divide or share your talents in the preparation of your shows?

Dana: I almost always direct. Jennifer music directs and choreographs the musicals. We generally design sets together, although Jennifer has a clearer vision in that department. She also designs sound, and I work closely with whoever is designing lights. Occasionally I do the light design, but only when absolutely necessary! When we don't have a costumer, Jennifer will often do the costumes as well.

C& C: As for their 2012 season, The Originals have chosen for the spring ABUNDANCE by Beth Henley, called by some a "revisionist Western." It's the story of "two mail-order brides who meet while waiting for their husbands to pick them up at the stagecoach station of a small town in Wyoming in the 1860's." Jennifer Porter plays timid romantic Bess, while Sally Wood is Macon, "high spirited and thrilled about the prospects of a new life in the West. Bess soon finds that her husband-to-be, Michael, has been killed and will be replaced by his brother, Jack (Dana Packard), a mean-spirited brute with a penchant for gambling. Macon's new husband, Will (C. Michael Howard), is an awkward widower with one eye and a family history of disfiguring mishaps. The play follows the women for 25 years – through infidelities, droughts, abduction-by-Indians, fame,

misfortune, separation, and ultimately reconciliation, but with humor as well as adventure and pathos, and was called by the New York Times Henley's 'most provocative play in years.'" Also featured in the cast is Christopher Reiling as Professor Elmore Crome. Performances will be at the Saco River Grange Hall April 27, 28 & May 3 – 5 at 7:30 pm and Apr. 29 at 2:30 (Thursday May 3 is pay-what-you-can).

Any long-term plans for future stage work or films? Since you both belong to SAG and Equity – has that helped or hindered?

Dana: We have several film projects in the pipeline, although we will be spending this year continuing to promote 40 WEST. Jennifer will be recording a CD in the summer, and I will be focusing on fundraising for SRGH at that time. We will also be attending screenings of 40 WEST from time to time. Tom Stoppard's HAPGOOD, with a cast we are very excited about, will go up at SRGH in November.

Jennifer: As mentioned above, we are both in SAG and AEA, plus I'm in the WGA and Dana is in the DGA. The Originals has worked under an Equity Special Appearance contract since 2005. As for films, THE BALLAD OF IDA AND DOOB was under a SAG contract, MR. BARRINGTON was under a SAG and DGA contract, and 40 WEST was under a SAG, DGA, and WGA contract! I'm very proud to be in the unions. There seems to me to be a rather negative opinion about unions in some circles in this state, but I'm a strong supporter of them. This is how I make my living, and they make sure I'm earning a living wage. If you want speaking roles in big films and national commercials, at some point you have to join SAG and/or AFTRA. Perhaps there are people who've had bad experiences, but I've only had wonderful ones! The unions are difficult to join, but I feel they are well worth the effort.

Dana: I feel the same about this – certainly with SAG and AFTRA. For me, there was a point where it became worth it to take myself out of certain markets in order to have access to auditions for Hollywood films, network TV shows and national ads, which are nearly all union jobs. But it did mean losing a lot of work locally that I had been enjoying in the early 90's. I wound up with less work, but the work I had paid much better. As for AEA, because there is a lot of good non-union theater in Maine, working to join AEA may not be for everyone. For me, I appreciate the little pension contributions I get every time I act on stage! As for the DGA, being a member has not constrained me at all, and sets me up well for future endeavors.

As you're getting closer to that 25th (Silver) Anniversary, do you have anything to say about how to make such a long-term commitment work for two theater people who live and work together?

Jennifer: I think what makes this work for us is that we actually really like each other! I can honestly say that at any given moment in time, there isn't anyone else I'd rather be with than Dana, and considering the high stress that can come with working in the arts, I'm so glad I have someone like him joined at my hip, as it were! There's no one better in a crisis! I also truly respect both him and his opinions, especially when his opinion is that I'm right. (Offered with a teasing laugh)

Dana: I'm sure what Jennifer meant to say was that I am usually right! Seriously, though, despite the constant challenges of producing art full time, I cherish working with Jennifer and hope our collaboration on all fronts continues for many decades to come. Advice for long-term success? ... I suppose listening to the other person. It seems so basic but can take a lot of practice, especially if you're passionate about the subject at hand, which all artists are. I find that I wind up learning a lot when I take the time to really listen closely. It's still thrilling to me when I realize my assumptions about what Jennifer is trying to communicate are confused and that there is something to learn. That makes life and work constantly interesting and full of promise.

Any comments on your experiences with the screenings of 40 WEST, especially in Vegas and NYC?

Jennifer: The screenings were a mix of nerves, excitement, agony, and relief! The last screening in NYC was fun because the venue was so amazing. The Duo Multicultural Art Center is in the East Village and has an inspiring history. It was there that John Philip Sousa held the first meeting of the Musicians' Union, and Emma Goldman gave speeches. The theater was also used for scenes in Francis Ford Coppola's THE GODFATHER II. There was a very appreciative sold-out crowd for the screening of 40 WEST, and it was really quite wonderful. The screening in Switzerland was amazing as well. The movie had to be subtitled in German, and I was afraid some of the humor would get lost in translation, but, as a writer, I couldn't have paid an audience to respond more the way I would have wanted! It was very satisfying (and made the long flight back and forth the week before we opened BETRAYAL with The Originals worth it!). The screening in Las Vegas was, well ... wild! The red carpet, flashbulbs, microphones, autographs, gowns, tuxedos, Wayne (Newton) and his bodyguards ... Very fun!

It is the sort of thing you can take again, and again, and again -- each time getting new insight, new material and a renewed love for the craft. It's like having a full body massage for your soul."

HEARD IN THE GREEN ROOM

First of all, here's a rundown of those shows covered in the February issue but which may still have another few performances left (& a few with information not available in Feb.) when this current issue is mailed:


