NOEL WITH THE NUTCRACKER (And More)

Okay, it's the December holiday season again, and what other show besides A CHRISTMAS CAROL is a perennial favorite? Right, THE NUTCRACKER ballet to the music of Tchaikovsky with a dancing Sugar Plum Fairy and other sweets, waltzing flowers, and a dashing prince carrying a dreaming little girl off to Candyland after a battle with over-sized mice!

Maine State Ballet has already begun to stage their production with performances at Merrill Auditorium in Portland November 29 & 30, and continuing December 5 at 7 pm, December 6 at 2 & 7 pm, and December 7 at 2 pm. They are joined by the orchestra led by Karla Kelley, who founded the Maine State Ballet Orchestra in 1987, and the Westcustago Youth Chorale directed by Ann Dillon. Staff member Christine Marshall Dow introduced me to Eliza Miller, Board Member and volunteer "Executive Director", who was drawn to MSB by her daughter as a student and then a member of the company, as well as her own long-time interest in dance. She took me to Artistic Director Linda MacArthur Miele, and I asked, "How do you keep THE NUTCRACKER fresh year after year? I remember a performance at Portland Players years ago, particularly the really little ones in one scene."

"We have new dancers. As one group graduates and goes away to college, the next batch rises up, and we have got the young ones. There is always a new group of dancers, and every year they're better. And I adjust the choreography for particular dancers to show what they do well. So we're always updating the choreography and the costumes. We still have the little ones as reindeer. In addition to our regular professional company, we do use as many students as possible. We hold auditions in August every year. We also have dancers coming in from all over the state. I double and sometimes triple cast. With 11 shows, we may have three different groups so that everyone gets an opportunity to dance." (Over the course of 7 performances, 250 local Maine dancers from Wells to Fryeburg will perform on stage.)

Does the company roster remain pretty stable?

"Yes, especially more so than, say, 15 years ago. This year we have three graduating and going away and three graduating and coming into the company. Most of our company dancers are over 18. Some go to school here at USM; some have other jobs, teaching, child care, etc. like actors!"

Linda MacArthur Miele started to dance at age 3 in Boston and at age 11 moved to New York to continue studying at George Balanchine's School of American Ballet. At 14 she was the youngest member accepted into the New York City Ballet Company. She has danced in Europe, the Middle East, and Canada as well as the NY State Theater at Lincoln Center in NYC. In her choreography she maintains the Balanchine style and has long-standing rights to his Nutcracker choreography as well as having received permission to stage his Serenade. Associate Director Gail Csoboth, who also trained and performed in classical ballet, teaches ballet, and is well known as a costume and scenic designer for MSB and Portland Opera Repertory Company.

Linda and her husband, Jonathan Miele, came to Maine in the late 1970's. How did that happen and how did you two meet?

"After my ballet career I thought I would have some fun, so I auditioned for a musical. We met at the audition, and we were both cast. The show was HIGH BUTTON SHOES, and we performed it at a dinner theater in New Jersey. We were there for about a year, and then we were both cast in LORELEI, which starred Carol Channing. We were in that for about two years on Broadway, but so many shows go on tour, sometimes even before they get to Broadway. We couldn't be sure of continuing to be cast in the same show, and we wanted to get married and have a family. Jon was from this area originally, so when we heard the Dorothy Mason School of the Dance, at the time run by Polly Thomas, was for sale, we decided to buy it."

Your daughter, Janet, and her husband, Glenn Davis, are both company members and will be dancing, respectively, the Sugar Plum Fairy and the Nutcracker Prince. Did they meet here at the school?

"Yes, Glenn was an All Star athlete who had done some theater in college and came to us wanting to learn to dance. He said he found that, 'I could work really hard here!' He is an exception – someone who came to dancing at 20 and became a leading dancer."

This year's Nutcracker cast includes more than 20 male dancers, ranging in age from 4 to 40-plus. Many have been dancing for years, locally or in national ballet companies, and even on Broadway. Others are new to dance but have extensive theater experience. Having such a large pool of talented male dancers to draw from gives Miele options she didn't previously have, and it allows MSB to stage ballets that might be beyond the realm of possibility for smaller companies. She credits MSB's scholarship program for promising male dancers with bringing more boys into the school. Also, whereas in the past male dancers may have taken a ribbing from their schoolmates, TV shows like *Dancing with the Stars* and movies like *High School Musical* have made dancing more appealing and those who can do it are now held in high regard.

Other principal dancers in this year's production are Fred Bernier and Rebecca Purser, and principal soloists are Chaelley Clauson, Katie Farwell, Kate Hamilton, and Christina Williams.

Maine State Ballet was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1986 and is a company of 25 dancers. The affiliated dance school began as the Maine State School for the Performing Arts in 1975 and offers instruction in ballet, jazz, tap, modern dance and acting to 500 students.

Their new facility in Falmouth has not only a number of dance studios for classes and rehearsals but also a costume room for building costumes, a large storage area for props and the costumes for the 19 ballets in MSB's repertoire, and the Maine State Ballet Theater, which seats 100 and gives the company the space and the opportunity for dancing that does not require the huge stage of the Merrill Auditorium. The theater is also available for other interested groups and is used at times by Mad Horse Theatre Company and Stages Academy. For information call MSB Theater Manager Fred Bernier at 781-7672.

On January 23 & 24 MSB will present *Tap, Tap, Jazz*, their annual showcase for their tap and jazz dance students, in the Maine State Ballet Theater. CINDERELLA, danced to the music of Serge Prokofiev, will be the spring show, also at the MSB Theater, March 20 – 22, 27 – 29, and April 3 – 5. The **Robinson Ballet** of Bangor has already begun their annual tour of this holiday tradition. They performed on November 15 in Berlin, NH, on November 22 at the University of Maine at Machias, and on November 30 at the Caribou Performing Arts Center. On December 13 at 2 & 7 pm and December 14 at 2 pm, they will be at The Grand in Ellsworth (call 207-667-9500 or visit www.grandonline.org); and on December 20 at 2 & 7 pm they will perform at Peakes Auditorium in Bangor with the Bangor Symphony Orchestra (call 207-942-5555 or 1-800-639-3221).

Husband and wife dancers Keith Robinson and Maureen Lynch are Co-Artistic Directors of this troupe. A Colorado native, Keith attended the University of Colorado and Boston University and began his dance career with Polly L. Thomas. Maureen, from southern Maine, also danced with Polly Thomas and with the Maine State Ballet. Both have danced professionally in Europe as well and continue choreographing and training aspiring dancers here in Maine.

And how do they keep THE NUTCRACKER fresh each year?

Maureen says, "Being community based, we always audition for the entire community and our surrounding communities, not just dancers from our school. Some are new dancers, some the same, but because they are young adults they continue to grow and change as dancers. Choreography is apt to change to showcase the strengths of individual dancers.

"Touring is always exciting with 50 dancers ranging in age from 9-59! The road is a great learning experience working in halls of different sizes, etc. The road can bring some headaches, but mostly terrific memories for us and our dancers, and hopefully we leave wonderful memories behind."

In the spring the company will present *Robinson Ballet Live* on April 3 & 4 at 7 pm at Penobscot Theatre's Bangor Opera House, 131 Main Street, Bangor, and on April 10 & 11 at 7 pm at The Grand in Ellsworth, ME. For information on the school and the company, visit www.robinsonballet.org.


THE VICTORIAN NUTCRACKER is the **Portland Ballet's** variation on this traditional offering.

How do you keep THE NUTCRACKER fresh year after year?

"That's easy. We keep changing the dancers," says Artistic Director Eugenia O'Brien. "They're professionals, and we don't want them to get tired of doing the same role. We all

know the music, and it's fun to dance a different role. And then we change the choreography to suit the different dancers. There are always changes! But it's really not as simple as it sounds. What we love about THE NUTCRACKER is the creative process. The dance is an oral tradition, a story telling phenomenon. It's not rote, but a creative process year after year. We all know the vocabulary – it's how the vocabulary is put together that's so much fun."

Portland Ballet's version differs from the traditional Nutcracker in that it's set in Portland's Victoria Mansion in the late 1800's, in costumes of the era, with the recent return from New Orleans of the owners, Mr. And Mrs. Ruggles Morse, who have their niece and nephew staying with them for the holidays. Eugenia O'Brien's careful research into the period has also peopled the Christmas Eve party with other Portland notables of the time, such as Mayor-Elect James Phinney Baxter, composer Hermann Kotschmar, and John Bundy Brown, wealthy owner of one of the largest sugar refining companies in America. The Portland Ballet Orchestra will play Tchaikovsky's music under the baton of Lawrence Golan, and the audience will be greeted in the Merrill's lobby by the Victorian Nutcracker Festival Singers caroling in Victorian costume under the direction of Mark Nordli.

Ms. O'Brien, a native of New Hampshire, graduated from the Boston Conservatory of Music with a BFA in Dance. How did she get to Maine?

"I had visited in Maine often and worked in camps here. When my husband was making a job change, he had a choice of going to California or Maine, and we decided to come to Maine. At first I taught ballet at Ram Island Dance. When there were students coming multiple times a week for class and wanting more, I decided it was time to open my own school, and that led to establishing the dance company as well. I saw it as an opportunity to offer a more professional training program and performance outlet in ballet. The school is designed to educate dancers from start to finish, including the summer programs that are available so the students learn about what's going on in dance beyond Maine."

The training includes C.O.R.P.S., an acronym for "Collaboration, Outreach, Recognition, Performance and Scholarship." This is a program for high school students from Cape Elizabeth to Lewiston, who mostly started pre-ballet at an early age and joined C.O.R.P.S. at around age 14 after demonstrating interest and commitment and the realization that dancing could become a career. They train three hours a day and receive high school credit.

"These students are Maine's ambassadors of dance going to various schools throughout the year to perform and demonstrate. It's a vocational tool for the schools and an educational tool for C.O.R.P.S. They learn how to perform in a different setting. When they graduate, they have the option of auditioning for the company here or moving on. Our ideal is to create dancers who become ambassadors of dance beyond the State of Maine. The professional dancers of our company come from all over. Most have a degree and have toured professionally but have come to Maine for the lifestyle."

Californian Vanessa Beyland, a graduate of NYU's Tisch School of the Arts with extensive performing and teaching experience on both coasts, is the Teen Workshop Director as well as assistant to the Director. She said, "Also some dancers from Maine who went away come back because they have found that Maine is a pretty good place to be!"

The Portland Ballet will perform excerpts from THE VICTORIAN NUTCRACKER in Lewiston at the Franco-American Heritage Center, 46 Cedar St., on Dec. 7 at 2 pm. Call (207) 689-2000. On Dec. 13 & 14 at 2 pm, the complete show will be danced at Kennett High School, 409 Eagles Way, North Conway, NH. Call 1-800-838-3006. And THE VICTORIAN NUTCRACKER will be on stage at Merrill Auditorium in Portland at 7:30 pm on Dec. 17, with full orchestra and singers. This year's production is staged by Nicole Getchell (also dancing Chinese Tea), a dance major graduate of Virginia Intermont College with further training at Portland School of Ballet and with Andrei Bossov, and a principal dancer with PBC. Other featured dancers from the professional company are Wyatt Barr (Nutcracker & Cavalier), John Saccone (The Eccentric), Nell Shipman (Snow Princess), Katrina Smedal (Sugarplum Fairy), Tyler Sperry (Snow Prince), and Rachel Willis (La Vivandiere). Arianna Lawson, who has trained with the C.O.R.P.S. program since 2007 and spent the summer with the Joffrey Ballet, will debut as Olivia (Clara in traditional Nutcrackers). In the spring the Portland Ballet will offer GISELLE at the John Ford Theater in Portland High School Mar. 28 & Apr. 4 at 7:30 pm, Apr. 5 at 2 pm. For information about the school and the company, visit www.portlandballet.org.

Bossov Ballet Theatre and School is located at Maine Central Institute in Pittsfield, ME, just off Interstate 95, 40 miles north of Augusta. Artistic Director Andrei Bossov, a native of St. Petersburg, Russia, is a Ballet Artist graduate of the St. Petersburg Academic Ballet School (Vaganova School) and has taught there as well as in the U.S., and was a dancer and

choreographer for 20 years with the Kirov Ballet Company. Under the auspices of Bossov Ballet Theatre School, he teaches an accredited ballet course in the curriculum of MCI, a private high school.

His brief bio says, "I am a choreographer, a coach, and a ballet instructor in technique, pointe, partnering, variations, and character dancing. My Russian pupils are dancing on the best stages of the world. Among them are Sergei Viharev, Olga Lihovskaya, and Maher Vaziev. My American students have been at the Ballet Met, Ballet Internationale, Ballet Theatre of Maryland, and Joffrey Ballet."

Bossov Ballet will present THE NUTCRACKER at Waterville Opera House, 93 Main St., Waterville, ME, on December 12 at 7 pm, December 13 at 2 & 7 pm, and December 14 at 2 pm. Call (207) 873-7000.

The BBTS staff includes Natalya Nikolaevna Getman, a native of Russia, a gymnastic champion at the age of 10, who trained at the Kirov School and danced, choreographed, and taught with the Moscow Ballet; and Anna Karpova and Vladimir Karpov, also natives of Russia who trained there and have danced with the Kirov Ballet and other Russian companies, and who currently teach in Canada during the fall-winter-spring and for Bossov Ballet Theatre each summer.

As with the other ballet companies, Bossov keeps THE NUTCRACKER fresh each year with changing the cast of dancers as they come along and/or appear and audition from other areas, and adjusting the choreography to fit the new dancers' strengths.

For a different holiday dance experience, there is still **Vivid Motion, Inc.**, Portland's Innovative and Kinda Quirky Dance Company, which for several years offered a NUTCRACKER BURLESQUE, but this year's show will be HOLIDAY BURLESQUE EXTRAVAGANZA at St. Lawrence Arts Center, 76 Congress St., Portland, with performances at 7:30 pm December 18 – 21, plus a 4 pm matinee on December 20, and a 2 pm matinee on December 21. Call (207) 775-5568.

Artistic Director MJ Emerson says, "This is more of a straightforward variety burlesque show. It has a dozen or so dances, some seasonally inspired, like *Rudolph the Red Hot Reindeer Tap Review*, and some that are more take-offs (did I really just pun like that?) of traditional genres, and, of course, some tasteful burlesque strip tease and 'show girl' dances – emphasis on tease; there's no true nudity in the show. Having said that, we do ask for mature audiences only."

In addition to Ms. Emerson, this year's choreographers include Cory Buckman, Byron Nilsen, Jessica Means, Emily Zack-Farrell, Alissa Laitres, and Cara Wilson. Portland's Favorite Comedian (*Portland Phoenix*'s 2008 Readers Poll) Brian Brinegar will be the emcee. Vivid Motion dancers live in southern Maine, from the Greater Portland area to far-off places like the Berwicks, Limerick, and Shapleigh! They range from classically trained professionals to club dancers and enthusiastic novices, and vary from college students to career professionals.

Remember, no children please, so, folks, you adults can be

entertained by Vivid Motion turning up the heat, but take the kiddies to one of the previously mentioned dance performances with Maine State Ballet, the Robinson Ballet, Portland Ballet, or the Bossov Ballet.

LYNNE CULLEN: STORYTELLER & PLAYWRIGHT

Lynn Cullen and I first met a few years ago at Suze Allen's Playwrights' Lab, where Lynne was one of the writers working to hone her craft and I was an actor called in with others to read aloud some of the plays in progress so the playwrights could hear what their words sounded like. We happened to sit next to each other at one point, and I noticed she was wearing a pin that said "Richard III." To me that suggested that she was a fellow believer that this English king had been much maligned by Tudor propaganda, a condition furthered by Shakespeare's play, also of the Tudor period, of course! That started our conversation!

Recently we got together at Coffee by Design on India Street, and I asked Lynne where she was from originally, how did she get interested in storytelling and playwriting, and how did she come to the Greater Portland area.

"I'm a native of Waterbury, Connecticut, graduated from the University of Connecticut with a degree in fine arts – painting, and I still do graphic design. When I was in Australia working for Greenpeace, I met my husband, Andy. What I was doing for Greenpeace was canvassing, so in a way I started storytelling then before it became official!

"Andy is British, a field biologist specializing in small carnivores, and in 1998 we had gone to live in England. But just after we moved there, Andy got an animal 'gig' in South America. After he left, I looked in the paper for something to do and saw a notice of an evening of storytelling at The Brokers Arms, a pub. The minute I saw it I wanted to do it, too, and that's how I really started. I began with folk tales, but now I use original tales as well.

"Also I began writing in England, taking a course called *Writing for Performance* – not really plays but something you stand up and say.

"I came back to the U.S. in the autumn of 2001. Before going to England I had lived in New Hampshire for 6 years, but I didn't want to locate in New Hampshire again. I wanted to be on the coast, came to Portland, loved it at first sight, and moved here in 2002. I took an acting course at AMMA, the acting school run by Suze Allen and Barbara Mather, and then took Suze's Playwrights' Lab and started writing plays.

"So far, three of my plays have been produced by the annual Acorn Productions Maine Playwrights Short Play Festival: ENDYMION in 2005, HEAVEN in 2006, and JESUS AND THE SEWING CIRCLE in 2007. I plan to submit one or more plays for the 2009 Festival.

"I became a member of MOOSE (Maine Organization Of Storytelling Enthusiasts), an organization that was already established when I got here. We meet the 2nd Wednesday of every month, currently at the North Star Café, 225 Congress Street, Portland. Our next meeting will be December 10, and I'm the host. We take turns being host, and the host chooses the featured performer of the evening. I wanted to be the host in December because I like Christmas! The evening starts at 7 pm when it's Open Mic – anyone can get up and tell a 10-minute story. After a 15-minute break, at 8:15 the wonderful Scottish musician/storyteller Jennifer Armstrong will perform." information on MOOSE. visit www.moosetellers.ning.com.]

Besides MOOSE, Lynne is a member of NSN (National Storytelling Network), the British Society for Storytelling, and LANES (League for the Advancement of New England Storytelling) and is also the editor and designer of the LANES quarterly newsletter, *The Museletter*.

"LANES has an annual conference. In 2009 it will be in late March in Rhode Island. I'll be going to that and also to one in England, *The Gathering*, which will be in early April in Cumbria."

How did you become so involved in Celtic tales?

"I have some Irish heritage (along with Italian and Lithuanian). My Irish uncle in Waterbury studied for the priesthood but then left it and became a policeman and is a great storyteller! And I went to Ireland when I was about 25. I've always liked the music. Now I go to Ireland once a year and while there study the Irish-style concertina with Noel Hill, who teaches in Ballyvaughan as well as in Durham, NY. He's a good teacher. I've actually learned to play the instrument!"

Lynne's other learning experiences have included a weeklong Storytelling Workshop at The Celebration Barn in South Paris, three years in Suze Allen's Playwrights' Lab, and two 7-week stand-up comedy (writing/performing) workshops with Tim Farrell, as well as *Voice of the Storyteller* residential workshop in Shropshire, England.

In May 2006, Lynne began producing *Seanachie Nights*, a monthly evening of Celtic/British stories and music at Bull Feeney's Pub, 375 Fore Street, Portland. Seanachie (pronounced <u>Shawn</u>-a-key) means storyteller.

"One of the things that made me fall in love with storytelling," she said, "is the way it's done in England, in pubs, great spaces with open, pleasant rooms where you can relax and have a drink. I wanted to recreate that here. Bull Feeney's has that wonderful upstairs room with great acoustics."

This month *Seanachie Nights* will feature Solstice Revels on December 15, 7-9 pm, at Bull Feeney's. Celebrate the Yuletide Season with storytellers Sebastian Lockwood reading A CHILD'S CHRISTMAS IN WALES by Dylan Thomas, Lynne Cullen relating some astounding Christmas legends, and Irish style fiddler Janet Lynch. There will be carol singing, too, and a great deal of good cheer! Lockwood, who will also read Truman Capote's A CHRISTMAS MEMORY, is a poet and teacher educated at Boston University and Cambridge University (UK). Janet Lynch is a gifted fiddler and also an actor with AIRE (American Irish Repertory Ensemble). Admission is free but donations will be accepted (\$9 suggested).

Recently Lynne has been taking Acorn's Playwrights/Improv Class, taught by Michael Levine. As part of the 2nd Friday Dramatic Reading Series on December 12 at 7:30 pm, one of her plays, PERFECT JOE, will be among those read at the Acorn Studio in the Dana Warp Mill, 90 Bridge Street, Westbrook.

"Since I began writing plays, "Lynne mused," my writing and storytelling overlap, so I took a short play I've been working on and turned it into a story: THE ROYAL COURT OF NEPTUNE. It's based on a story my father told me about when he was in the Navy in the South Pacific in World War II." Perhaps it will be part of a storytelling evening soon.

In November, instead of the 3rd Monday, *Seanachie Nights* was on Saturday, November 15, so that Mike Burns, a native of the Iveragh Peninsula on the Ring of Kerry and now a resident of Montreal, could bring his own magical stories from the Irish tradition to Bull Feeney's Pub.

Also in November, traditionally the weekend before Thanksgiving, storytelling groups from all over the world get together in their own areas for a special evening. Here in Maine the *Tellebration* was November 21 at One Longfellow Square, the 8th time it has been in Portland over the years. Lynne was one of the storytellers on this special evening, and master storyteller Antonio Rocha was the emcee. Plus this year there was a *Family Tellebration* at Breakwater School on November 22, when storytellers included children's story specialist Jody Fein.
