"The Source For Theater Happenings"

BEACHES, BOATS, BIKES, and ... GREAT THEATER!

"It's been difficult," muses Neil Pankhurst, British-born Artistic Director of **The Winnipesaukee Playhouse**, reflecting on the challenges of running a year-round theater in the resort town of Weirs Beach, New Hampshire. "We don't get a lot of the tourist trade. If someone comes here for a week, they want to be on the beach or their boat for every last bit of sunshine they can. Our largest audience base comes from locals and second home owners. They've been very supportive. But it's been hard getting the word out that we're here. We're kind of in this little corner tucked away; we don't have a lot of signage."

The forest of signs that assault your eyes here hawk everything from T-shirts to tattoos, vying for the attention of visitors looking for bass (the fish, not the instrument) and riding bikes (we're not talking about Lance Armstrong). The 83-seat Playhouse in The Alpenrose Plaza mini-mall doesn't loom large on their fish-finder screens or over their handlebars. But for those who make their way to this unlikely venue the reward is theater of such quality that it has reeled in a boatload of New Hampshire Theatre Awards.

Neil and his wife, Lesley, who handles the marketing, teamed with her brother Bryan Halperin and his wife, Johanna, to open the Playhouse three years ago. Earlier this year they became a non-profit and hold a unique distinction in New Hampshire: the only theater to run both community and professional seasons. I met recently with Neil and Lesley to discuss their multi-faceted operation. One of my first questions was how they cope with the noise of un-muffled motorcycles. Weirs Beach is a biker's mecca, especially during New Hampshire's famous Bike Week.

"We don't have productions during Bike Week," smiles Lesley diplomatically, "but the rest of the time they're not as bad as you might think. Yes, you can hear them as they drive by, but it's not that much of a problem."

Neil continues, "We've been to theater in London and New York, where obviously you've paid a lot of money. In London you'll hear the Underground trains going by; in New York it's police and ambulance sirens, so this is no more distracting."

"The bigger problem for us," Lesley adds, "is that every Friday night in summer they have fireworks at Weirs Beach. So if our shows aren't over by 10 pm, the last scenes can be completely muffled by fireworks!"

"Friday night we really have to start on time," agrees Neil, "so if someone's late, too bad, 'cause we're gonna go anyway. One of the plays we did last year didn't get done 'til about 20 past 10, so 15 minutes of that last act were just a constant bang, bang,

bang!"

Bikes and fireworks aside, the two couples have created an attractive, efficient space in a retail complex. Neil discovered the space on a trip to pick up mail and was immediately taken with its high ceilings, a great advantage for seating and lighting angles. The three units had housed a health food store, a boat museum, and warehouse space, so it took hard work and ingenuity to make it workable.

"A black box is supposed to have a nice, square shape; this is not a nice square shape!" chuckles Neil. "We have a door space here, an indentation there, which gets a little annoying at times, but we work around those. It presents itself with some challenges, but the space as a whole is very flexible."

Currently (May 18-27) the space is configured traditionally for their community production of Neil's adaptation of Goldoni's THE SERVANT OF TWO MASTERS. Seating risers face the stage against the back wall with backstage behind and to the side.

"This is how the space is used for most of the summer, which is 'end on,' " says Neil, "but we can change the configuration."

"To 'in the round,' 'thrust,' 'traverse,' " adds Lesley.

"All of this moves; there's nothing in here that can't be moved," says Neil proudly. "The entire stage can be taken down, the seating platforms taken down, the chairs moved. For OUR TOWN half the audience was banked up over here, the other half over there.

"As a director, I like to change the actor – audience relationship. I think particularly in Europe that relationship is considered more valuable than it is here, except, I think at colleges and universities. When you go to community and even regional theaters, it tends to be more fixed.

"I hate proscenium arch theaters! The older I get, the more passion I have for hating them, because there's nothing you can do with them; it's like acting in another room. Even when we're 'end on' here, there's no proscenium. Not to be pretentious about it, but it's all about communing."

Neil's theater philosophy was developed over years of teaching, which was where he met Lesley and Bryan. "I first met them in 1988 when I taught them both at a theater camp in Massachusetts. They were, you know, 'kids at camp,' but we became good friends. We all had a passion for theater, obviously. Years and years later, Lesley moved to England, and we met up again, and that's how our relationship started."

"My brother and I are from Westchester, NY, so we were taken

to New York theater from a very young age," relates Lesley. "I started performing in elementary school. I was Oberon in A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM! I continued through high school and summer camp, graduated with a theater major from Wellesley. I performed up until the end of college, but I realized that I didn't have the drive to be a professional actress. I wanted to go to England and got a student visa to get my Master's in Arts Administration. From there I went to work in the West End for 2-1/2 years. It was great background and training. We were given free tickets to any show; we were going 2 – 3 times a week! That was a fun few years."

Neil continues, "I had been teaching for 15 or so years, but I decided it was time to leave London. The stability was good, but I wanted to work in professional theater. We were planning on moving to the southwest, maybe the Cotswolds area. We were seriously looking, but I wasn't going to have a job in a few months!" he laughs. "In April, Bryan called to say he'd found a theater in Maine."

That theater was The Carousel Music Theater in Boothbay [Covered in Cast & Crew June 1999 issue. They report that old friend Dominic Garvey is well and still tickling the ivories!] Negotiations failed to produce a deal; they realized they wanted a year-round venue, but by then their focus had gone from Merry Olde England to the New One.

"We moved back over to Massachusetts in October and began to look for a location rather than an existing theater. We looked at upstate New York; Newport, Rhode Island; Northampton, Massachusetts. Finally Bryan said, 'I think we're going to phone some town, and they'll say: We'd love for you to be here!'

"Being from Bournemouth, I wanted to be by the sea preferably; couldn't find anything. So I looked at the map of New Hampshire and saw this big lake. We phoned the City of Laconia, and they said: 'We'd love for you to be here,' just as Bryan had predicted! So we came up and explored the area, and I guess we don't have to go into any more detail 'cause we're here."

.And here they will be in the mini-mall for this season and next. Plans are afoot to move to a much larger venue away from the beach (and the fireworks!) with as many as 250 seats. In the meantime they're excited about the upcoming professional season. They open with STONES IN HIS POCKETS by Marie Jones.

"Part of me is really excited about doing it, part of me is terrified," states Neil. "It's basically two men playing 15 different characters with literally nothing on stage, so that just with the way they move, with the way they use the voice, they change character. Having seen it in London, I know how good it can be, so my expectation is that I should do the same. I want to be sure it makes people laugh."

Neil's challenge as a director is made even greater in the summer when the shows have only two weeks of rehearsal. The off-season community shows have a longer, more laid-back preparation. For the current THE SERVANT OF TWO MASTERS, Neil brought the cast into his process of writing the adaptation. The couple is proud and pleased with the core community group and gratified for local support. And moments of brilliance.

"They helped a lot," says Neil. "I had the simple line: 'That's the way the cookie crumbles.' The guy playing the role said, 'It's set in Venice so the line should be: That's the way the biscotti crumbles.' It gets a great laugh every night."

The couples dream of a growing reputation not just for themselves but for other theaters in the region. Unfortunately the nearby Lakes Region Summer Theatre has closed, a popular music theater venue in Meredith.

"We're picking up a number of their audience this summer," says Lesley. "It will be interesting to see how people who are used to OKLAHOMA and ANNIE GET YOUR GUN will react when they come here. But we know that our past audiences have appreciated the artistic standards that we've set."

Well worth a trip to the Land of Boats and Bikes!

NEW MUSIC THEATER DEBUTS IN MIDCOAST MAINE

Northport, ME. This summer, midcoast residents and their friends and houseguests will be able to enjoy three first-rate productions of innovative, zany, laugh-out-loud musical theater productions in the brand new, 136-seat **Northport Music Theater** located on Route 1 in Northport.

Founders Ruth and John Gelsinger, who are well known throughout the area for their musical talents, are thrilled to announce that the premier season will open on Saturday night, June 16, with a performance of THE MUSICAL OF MUSICALS, which is, just in case you're wondering, a musical. This special performance will be followed by a gala champagne and catered light supper with the cast and crew, to which all audience members are invited.

MUSICAL, by Eric Rockwell and Joanne Bogart, was a smash hit in New York City when it debuted in 2003 and since then has played in regional theaters to packed houses across the country. The show's premise is simple: a young ingénue ("I can't pay the rent"), an evil landlord ("You must pay the rent"), and the hero (I'll pay the rent") all populate the same musical as scored by five legends of Broadway's musical theater – Rodgers & Hammerstein, Stephen Sondheim, Jerry Herman, Andrew Lloyd Webber, and Kander & Ebb. The director of the show is former artistic director of the Belfast Maskers Tobin Malone, who is well known for her creative and innovative approach. In the cast are Dagney C. Ernest, Roger Marcotte, Caitlin Whalen, and Jason Wilkes, with Ruth Gelsinger at the piano. The regular run of MUSICAL begins on June 19 with evening performances Tuesdays through Saturdays until June 30. Matinees are at 3:30 on June 21, 23, 28, and 30.

On July 11 get ready to tee off for the opening night of GOLF: THE MUSICAL, a two-hour revue filled with gags, puns and ditties in the form of 18 musical vignettes. This fast-paced Off-Broadway hit celebrates the fun, frustrations, and humor of the grand old game. A reviewer in The New Yorker said of GOLF that "apart from delivering their better-than-par melodies, the players also impersonate the devoted golfers Bob Hope and Bing Crosby and invite members of the audience onstage to join them in a putting contest." Directing GOLF will be Jason Bannister, who is the drama advisor at Troy Howard Middle School in Belfast, a 4th grade teacher at the Nickerson School in Swanville, and an avid golfer! GOLF will run Wednesdays through Saturdays with evening performances at 7:30 pm, July 11 – 28. Matinees are at 3:30 pm on July 14, 21, and 28. "Fore" warning, though: this is definitely not a show for the kids.

The final show of the summer is SIX WOMEN WITH BRAIN DEATH OR EXPIRING MINDS WANT TO KNOW. This is a take-no-prisoners satire. Nothing is sacred in this series of racy, irreverent and very, very funny songs and sketches, spoofing everything from daytime soaps, Barbie and Ken's secret fantasy life, high school reunions, and game shows. SIX WOMEN ran for a record-breaking 8 years at a theater in Sacramento. Taking on the directing role is Peter Clain, who says he's seen the show 3 times and has long dreamed of directing it. A high school Spanish teacher and drama club director, Peter has directed and acted with the Belfast Maskers and Penobscot Theatre of Bangor. SIX WOMEN opens August 8 at 7:30 pm and runs evenings, Wednesdays through Saturdays, until August 25. Matinees are at 3:30 pm August 11, 18, and 25.

EARNEST ABOUT WILDE AT THE STAGE

This year The Stage at Spring Point has a new artistic director. I asked Janet Ross, who has formerly been an artistic director at Biddeford City Theater and Portland Players as well as a veteran of many years teaching theater, how this change occurred.

"I had a phone call last September," she said, "telling me that Seth Rigoletti, their executive director, had resigned for personal reasons. So the Board was deciding whether to go dark for a year or for good, whether to replace Seth with another executive director, or look at a different position like an artistic director. Those were the options on the table. The Board decided not to go dark, that they wanted The Stage to move forward into its fifth year. Apparently they chose to go in the direction of hiring an artistic director who would also be the show director during this year of transition. Someone from the Board called me to ask if I would be interested in this position; so I met with several Board members in small groups and individually. They went through the whole process of taking resumes and checking references and narrowed the field to two candidates. We were both interviewed again, and then I was hired and began reading plays!

"I came on the Board officially in January, and that was when I made the presentation of the show selected, the concept of the show, the design of the show, how many cast members and so forth. In the past there would have been more time, with a 'post mortem' on the closed play in August, followed by selection of a new play and hiring a director for it, and applying for grants, all of that happening in the fall."

And how did you happen to choose THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST?

"In trying to think of a summer show and where our performance space is located at Spring Point, I wanted to choose something that wasn't heavy, so I thought a comedy would be great summer fare. And I thought that since the actors are all paid, a smaller cast would not drain the company's resources in a year of transition. Also I love the genre of British drawing room comedy, and I wanted something that I'm passionate to direct and a play that I've never done, giving me a challenge as a director. I love the wit and the genius of Oscar Wilde. I thought audiences coming to sit under the stars to see a play would appreciate the wit and humor. I also wanted to do a period play in a period they had not explored yet at The Stage (1895 in England) and show the diversity of the company, as well as appealing to different actors so as to include some who might not feel comfortable doing Shakespeare but might come out for THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST by the second most quoted playwright after William Shakespeare!

"The first actor I approached was Mark Honan because I wanted him to play Lady Bracknell if he was interested. (He will be playing the part as an actress, not as a man in drag,

with a name and program bio that he has created.) Then we advertised for actors for the other roles and had so many responses that we had to schedule a third day for auditions and were totally booked every 15 minutes! So now all the actors are contracted and we have a multi-generational cast with Keith Anctil as Jack, Amy Pelkey as Gwendolen, Bill Cook as Algernon, Ariel Francoeur as Cecily, Harlan Baker as Dr. Chasuble, Karen Ball as Miss Prism, and Nate Amadon as Lane/Merriman.

"This year we're having 'Welcome to the Classics' at 7:15 -7:30 pm, a sort of teaser to the main production. I wanted a one-man show with a connection to the play called 'Wild About Wilde.' I remembered Harlan and I had done an evening of Chekhov in summer theater years ago, and I've never forgotten how riveting a performance he gave of 'On the Harmfulness of Tobacco.' So I met with Harlan and shared the ideas I had about it. He said he would love to do it and 'Do you care who I am?' I said, 'I just need you to be somebody who knows Oscar Wilde, who will be in authentic costume, and I want it light and anecdotal, not professorial. So he has written a brilliant, funny one-man piece as a Victorian actor from the St. James Theatre, where THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST was premiered. 'Wild About Wilde' will be performed every night but opening night.

"Rounding out the Senior Creative Staff are Patrick Dullea, doing triple duty as Scenic, Costume, and Properties Designer, and Nicole Sirois as Production Manager. Other key players are Adam Klein (Lighting Designer), Deb Puhl (Technical Director), David Howe (Master Carpenter), Meg Baker (Stage

Manager), Carol Thurston (Master Tailor), and Robert Towle (Wig Stylist).

"We are also doing a Young Actors Institute June 25 – 29, 12:30 pm – 4:30 pm, this year at Wilkinson Park Community Center, New York Avenue, South Portland. This acting intensive is for recommended students in grades 9 – 12 and will focus on two areas of creative study: (1) exploring vocal techniques, theatrical gaming, points of concentration, creative storytelling, and improvisation; (2) in connection with THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST, character development, script analysis, scene study, dialect and manners, and elements of design. The faculty will include myself, Mark Honan, and Patrick Dullea."

HARD TIMES, Belfast Maskers May Production

Jennie Hahn - The Open Waters Theatre Arts

In Zero Station, a gallery space in Portland's Bayside district, an ensemble of 8 actors perform four short plays based on Bertolt Brecht's poem "The Stone Fisherman." A lone actor stands in a spotlight and recites the poem before each play unfolds in a minimalist setting. In one play a mother and daughter converse over washing dishes, while the daughter has visions of a fisherman. In another, a lone man enters from the back of the house pushing a shopping cart leaving stones all over the playing area. In the next vignette two industrial workers in white face masks are locked out of their space. In the final play a mother and father try to cope with an autistic child.

THE STONE FISHERMAN was a result of the collaboration of Jennie Hahn, Christopher Reiling, Tessy Seward, and Virginia Collins. Together they developed scripts for four short plays based on the Brecht poem. They started work in January. They held weekly discussions and finalized their scripts in mid-April and rehearsed for three weeks before performing at Zero Station... All four of the playwrights appeared in the plays as well as actors Anna Korsen, Derek Converse, Kerry Sullivan, and Tess Van Horn.

The driving force behind this new theater ensemble is Jennie Hahn. Her vision of theater was heavily influenced by the Cornerstone Theatre Company, which toured all over the United States before settling in Los Angeles in the mid 90's. Hahn grew up in Thomaston, Maine. Her parents helped to found the Watts Hall Community Players and she made her community theater debut at age 10 in ALL THROUGH THE NIGHT at the Camden Civic Theatre.

"My favorite roles from my childhood include Little Red in INTO THE WOODS, Puck in A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM, and Hero in MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING", says Hahn. She also performed with the Midcoast Children's Theatre in Waldoboro.

Hahn attended Vassar College where her focus was on acting and scenic design. Vassar afforded her a crack at non-traditional casting when she played King Richard in RICHARD II and the roles of Stephano, Antonio and Ariel in THE TEMPEST. After graduating from Vassar she moved to New York, then California, where she appeared in Ken Roht's ORPHEAN CIRCUS in Los Angeles and produced Genet's THE MAIDS in Berkeley. But traditional theater wasn't enough to satisfy her. Hahn wanted to incorporate her experience of growing up in Maine and her desire to have communities tell their stories through the medium of theater. She found the Cornerstone Theatre Company on line and volunteered for them.

The Cornerstone Theatre Company describes itself as -a *Cornerstone,a multi-ethnic ensemble*. They commission and produce new plays, both original works and contemporary adaptations of classics, which combine the artistry of professional and community collaborators. By making theater with and for people of many ages, cultures and levels of theatrical experience, Cornerstone builds bridges between and within diverse communities.

She found their mission statement to be just the type of theater she was looking for and she joined them as a volunteer intern. Much of the work of the company was based on stories drawn from the different communities they worked with. "They would work with neighborhoods, metro workers and religious communities", says Hahn. "Then I was hired as a stage manager, props mistress and performer. I even made puppets for them."

When she returned to Maine she began looking for ways to produce that vision of theater in Maine, which included community building, particularly in areas open to gentrification. "When I moved here, it was just me", she says. "I began by trying to find an artistic focus in the community. I did a lot of research and I met a lot of artists. I had to decide on what community based project I wanted to do."

Last autumn she conceived a *Living History Project* that consisted of sculptured installations that had performance elements worked into the experience of viewing the installation. It was performed at the Neal Street Garage in Portland. "It was one of those spaces that somebody could just walk in and use", says Hahn. "The people who lived there rented the space and they would rent it out to performers and music acts."

Hahn built her installation at the back of the room using theater flats and the existing walls. Fabric was draped and hung to waist level so that audience members could move in between the spaces of the hanging fabric. In the corner of the room was a chair with a "window" hanging behind it. Rocks and seaweed covered the floor. The space could accommodate about 15 to 20 people who made up the audience. The audience would hang out in the space and suddenly the lights came up and the actors entered the space. Their performance was half improvised and half scripted. "They created scenes and delivered monologues", says Hahn. "We wanted to have the audience make their way through the installation in their own time." Christopher Reiling, Virginia Collins, and Anna Korsen were also involved in the *Living History Project*.

Now that THE STONE FISHERMAN is over she is starting to think about her next project. "I would like to transition into work in a project that engages the community," Hahn says. "I'd like to have a conversation with the community. One of my ideas is to do a mother and daughter project - sort of create a piece about what that relationship is - and create a piece about what it is like to be a mother and daughter in Maine." Another idea she has is a project about the history of logging and its effect on communities in Maine.

She is now in the process of fund raising for **Open Waters Theatre Arts**. "My goal is building a theater presence in the communities across the state of Maine that would build communities around certain issues around the state. I want to tell the story of that community and what the community wishes to tell about itself."

Jennie Hahn currently works as a one-on-one pre-school aid for a child with special needs at St. Elizabeth's Child Care Center in Portland.

A DO-IT-YOURSELF PLAYWRIGHT

In July 2006, our local church put on an encore performance reading of my comedy drama THE ULTIMATE SUCCESS, which drew a capacity audience and a standing ovation in the same church the previous March. It also raised a good sum of money for the church from voluntary contributions. Our town in Maine (Cushing), population 1,200, is located at the tip of a peninsula jutting out to sea from the mainland. It's called Wyeth country because here is where three generations of Wyeths have spent their summers. It's also the year round home of several published writers and a number of outstanding but less renowned artists besides the Wyeths.

To me the play's success is an outright anomaly because it had been rejected by several dozen theater companies around the country. When you know the play's plot you may wonder why. The subject is quite timely. A celebrity CEO commits fraud, bringing disgrace upon himself and his family. The last half of the play deals with the daring scheme the CEO devises to extricate himself. The final scene ties it all up neatly with a surprise. Throughout the reading in March 2006 the audience sat fastened to the stage and their seats, laughed precisely where they should have, and when it was over, asked if we would do it again for the summer people who double the population of the town during July and August. Thus the July performance reading again, and again an enthusiastic audience response.

After submitting my plays (I've written more than twenty) to theater companies both in the U.S. and England over the years, all were rejected except by a troupe in Columbus, Ohio, who staged one of my one-act plays, and a small company here in Maine who plans to produce one of my full-length plays in the Spring of 2007. Mind you, this was all that resulted from among almost 700 submissions. Determined I've been, if nothing else. As a result, I've decided to stop submitting for three reasons: 1) theater companies stick to the tried and true, the familiar, in order to maximize much needed revenue; 2) after realizing that theater companies seeking original plays receive hundreds of submissions, I concluded the odds of having a play accepted are mighty slim; and 3) my plays are realistic, character driven, and tell a story. But that's not the prevailing style today, which tends to be more inward oriented and dealing with smaller issues. I'm not recommending that other playwrights give up as I have. Many unknown playwrights are certainly succeeding.

Back in the 50's – that's how long I've been writing drama – Playhouse 90, which did live TV plays written by competent, well-known playwrights on the issues of the day, accepted my first play about a college basketball star who considered himself a failure after peaking out in college. That's the kind of drama I was raised with and, in college, educated by, as we studied plays such as DEATH OF A SALESMAN concerning life in American society and so on. Seeing that writing in an "old-fashioned" way about today's issues with modern fully formed characters failed to impress most artistic directors, I

began questioning whether any of my plays would ever receive a full staging before a broad audience. I began questioning their worth and to prove that they had any, I had to devise a way to test them before live audiences. They would be the judge, not some artistic director. Just think how many bad plays and bad movies you've seen, proof that the person or persons who had accepted a script simply couldn't tell that it didn't work.

Well, how then to find readers and a venue? It so happens our town has a retired gentleman who has become the Town Crier. Via almost 400 e-mail addresses he sends out announcements and general news concerning town affairs. He generously agreed to e-mail a solicitation for readers to do one of my plays. Meanwhile the church in town, seeing a performance reading as a fund-raiser, offered its facility, including preparing refreshments after each performance. And the publicity person from the town's Historical Society agreed to compose and send out press releases on the plays with photos of the cast to our several regional news organizations.

The response to the e-mails was surprisingly successful, among them a woman who taught directing at Columbia, a banker, a college dean, a business executive, a social worker, a nurse, a minister, a psychologist, a high school teacher, etc. Most had no acting experience; some did acting in high school. Many were older retirees who acknowledged their limited short-term memories. But all were interested in theater and welcomed becoming involved in the nonthreatening way of a performance reading. So abandoning the possibility of a memorized staged production, after a half dozen rehearsals, the inexperienced cast became the characters they portrayed almost as well as if they were seasoned actors. We did the first play reading about religious prejudice and a parent "letting go" three summers ago. The readers wowed the audience. The next summer some from the old cast plus some new members, all neighbors, read a second play concerning racial prejudice. Not having any African Americans in our town, the reader of that role wore black. And this past summer we read the third play I described earlier.

A fourth play was given a reading in October 2006 with mostly experienced actors and directed by the lady who formerly taught at Columbia, and again had an enthusiastic response from the audience. So what's next? Still yearning to have these now proven plays given a full production, I'm attempting to form a theater troupe in Portland, Maine's largest city, where many experienced and aspiring actor live. The city has numerous available venues, and one interested party has indicated she could do the publicity. Next? Who knows? Off or Off-Off-Broadway? Does where matter? What matters is that I have many more plays to read or put on in our town where it is now becoming a tradition. And personally, at one play, or even two plays, a year, I have enough to last for the rest of my already long life.
