SPROUTED IN BROOKLYN, GROWING STRONG IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

"I don't like to say it's at the high school because of the image it conjures up. It's the Community Auditorium; it just happens to be located in the school."

Nancy Barry is proudly showing me the beautiful 420-seat theater that is home to her **Summer Theatre in Meredith Village**, set in the rolling hills beside Lake Winnipesaukee in the lakes region of New Hampshire. I confessed to her that I had conjured the image of my high school 'cafetorium', where the same metal folding chairs we sat on for lunch were rearranged on the linoleum floor to create the audience space for our Drama Club offerings. Here instead were comfortable seats nicely raked to provide great sightlines and fine acoustics, all air-conditioned.

"Acoustically, it's really sound," Nancy confirmed. "I do use some amplification, a teeny bit, because my audience is largely

seniors. My actors say, 'I don't need a mike.' I say, 'You don't need a mike, they need you to have a mike!'

Rehearsal for the Inter-Lakes High Sschool band concert sends us outside to continue the interview. A lovely view of the valley and nearby hills backdrops the school's NFL caliber football field and manicured grounds. It's the alma mater of Bradford Anderson, Emmy nominated for his role as the quirky 'Spinelli' on General Hospital.

"In the summer, my actors hang out up here on the ledge 'cause the view is gorgeous. We take pictures of the sunsets," says Nancy, looking ahead to precious moments when the talented young professionals she brings from the city get to enjoy the delights of this classic New Hampshire resort area -- precious and well-earned, since they'll be working hard.

"I've got 24 actors, 18 staff," she relates, noting the responsibility of managing such a large group. "I'll be writing 50 contracts! I always have 20-24 actors here. These are big musicals, and I'm looking for professional talent, so I bring them in. The people in MY WAY have to stay all summer 'cause it runs for one week and then every other Monday through the end of CAMELOT. So I try to use people throughout if I can."

The words "my" and "I" punctuate Nancy's speech quite often as she describes her theater. It never seems vain or arrogant as this dynamic and driven native of Brooklyn and Jersey details the process of forging a high caliber operation in this bucolic setting.

"I was raised in Jersey, about an hour away from New York, so I was very aware of what was going on there. Then I went to Emerson College in Boston and did undergraduate and graduate work. It was a great school for me because it was a place where you could be pretty independent. You could try a lot of stuff; you didn't have to pick a major and wait two years to start doing hands-on work, only to find that it wasn't what you wanted.

"The first year I was the president of my class and directed a television production. I was in a New Directions Production Company where I did some directing, some production, acting, singing, children's theater; I felt like I really explored a lot of different stuff. I found out pretty early on what I was really interested in doing and not doing.

"Every year I hire some kids from there; I make sure I do. The school has changed a lot, but it still seems to be a creative think tank, which is what I liked about it."

Nancy took her degrees, talent and energy back to New York, where, as they say, she did it all, producing, directing, acting, cabaret and a one-woman show. She even created a theater training program called Music Theatre Artists. But it was a "special summer" spent at the New London Barn Playhouse as

an intern in 1983 that fertilized the roots that would grow deep in New Hampshire's rocky soil. Owner/Producer Norman Leger became her mentor and dear friend.

"Norman taught me everything in the world about how to take care of your audience, figure out what they want and give them what they want. He taught me an awful lot about what to do and how to do it."

By 1985 she was serving as Casting Director for the Barn, and just a few years ago, Mr. Leger asked her to become the Artistic Managing Director upon his retirement. But the move to non-profit status brought a new challenge many of us have faced: dealing with a board.

"After the transition to non-profit, they offered me a contract that had all kinds of stipulations in it. I'm a very independent person, and they wanted me to give away every ablity to make decisions on my own. I had promised Norman that I would protect his legacy. When I made a decision, it was what Norman always taught me, which is 'What is the best thing for the Theater?' I face that all the time; you're always putting out fires. Somehow they didn't get that with the board."

Norman Leger had passed away, and Nancy was faced with a difficult decision. With the strength she had gained by always being her own woman, she made a bold move.

"I put my condo on the market, and it sold the next day! I felt very strongly that it was a message from Norman. I went in to the board and said, 'I'm not taking this contract. I've sold my condo.' And they said, 'Already?' and I said, 'One day.' I had decided to open my own theater. My contract there ran out in November of 2007, and I opened here in June of 2008."

"Here", was the former home of the Lakes Region Summer Theatre, where, in 1992, Nancy had directed their first musical. Norman had also mentored the original owners, David and Peter Ramsey, so it was a comfortable fit for her, but not an instant success.

"I moved really fast, because I knew what to do, but nobody knew we were here because the theater had gone extinct. My first year we lost a million dollars, it felt like. It took a year, but people said things like, 'This is the best show we've seen here in years,' so it began to catch on quickly after that. The next year we had a 17% increase during what was the worst summer in

years for most theaters. We still didn't make money, but we broke even. And this year I'm hoping that we're going to cross over that threshold. I've got 300 subscribers who already have their tickets, group sales have almost tripled, and I'm getting calls for every show in the season right now."

Nancy proudly wears the title of Producing Director, though she clearly has the credentials to add the Artistic adjective.

"Being a producing director is a Chief Cook and Bottle Washer kind of position, and it makes sense for me. I'm a hands-on person; I get bored if I'm only doing one thing. I'll be in the costume shop; I work on costumes all year long. I work with box office people, I work on marketing, I do the hiring. I could direct if I lost a director, but in the summer I'm too busy.


"I wish all I had to do was be an Artistic Director," she laughs. "Luckily I have such strong directors that I don't have to take that on. Brian Feehan will be here; he's been with me since I was back at the Barn. He did our BUDDY HOLLY, our SOUND OF MUSIC, and he's going to do FIDDLER this year. He's amazing; there's very little I have to do as far as artistic when he's directing. I know it'll be good; I know it's gonna happen.

"My director of CAMELOT, Norb Joerder, directed the last Broadway revival of CAMELOT with Robert Goulet. He works with stars all over the country; he's got all these shows in his back pocket. He did my OKLAHOMA last year. He came to me right after he had re-created the original Agnes DeMille choreography for the Rogers and Hammerstein Foundation archives. He came here and in five days he was doing full runthroughs.

"And the guy that's doing SPELLING BEE ... is totally creative. His name is John Baker. He thinks outside the box in the biggest way. He takes shows that I think are just okay and makes them wonderful; he's so funny, so creative. And he's also playing Tevye. He's another person that's travelled with me from the Barn. He was in charge of the Children's Theater, played roles. When I moved, he moved.

"I'm very lucky to have that kind of loyalty. There's a lot of talent that I've cast and worked with in the years that I was there

that will go wherever I go because they know that I'm completely committed to high quality theater. The standards are really high for me and for us.

"I was discussing this with someone just yesterday. We always have this kind of balancing process because my audience wants to see 'Feel Good, Upbeat, Broadway Style, Summertime Musicals'. One of my favorite shows that I've directed was CABARET at the Barn. I like the stuff that has meat in it, but you can't always do them. My company, Brian, in particular, is dying to do SWEENEY TODD. He wants to do GRAND HOTEL. He's got all these great ideas, but I'm saying, 'Brian, wake up! You wanna put me out of business!?

"I do want to do art; I really do. I love to go over to the Winni Playhouse and see a good play in the middle of my season. It's refreshing to just sit back and see a good play. I'm hoping that I'm picking shows that are really good pieces of literature, but at the same time they have to be what my audience wants to see."

Finding that balance, staying true to her own ideals, answering Norman Leger's question, "What is the best thing for the Theater?" means that Nancy Barry's audience thinks of <u>her</u> theater as <u>their</u> theatrer.

The Summer Theatre in Meredith also sponsors a summer theater camp for local teens that produces a children's series presented on Thursdays and Saturdays at 11 am. The kids work with the resident professionals and talented college students. This year's shows will be PETER PAN July 15 - 17, CHARLOTTE'S WEB July 29 - 31, and WINNIE THE POOH August 12 - 14.

On the main stage MY WAY, A Tribute to Frank Sinatra, runs June 29 – July 4 and then Mondays July 12 & 26 and August 9. Next will be FIDDLER ON THE ROOF July 6 – 18, CHICAGO July 20 – August 1, CAMELOT August 3 – 15, and finally THE 25th ANNUAL PUTNAM COUNTY SPELLING BEE August 17 – 22.

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WHAT'S NEW?

A 24-hour play festival? What does that mean? How does that work?

When the first email came about it, I thought, "That can't be meant for me," and hit the delete key. About a week later I received another email specifically directed to me asking if I would be an actor since they really wanted to have a diverse group as to ages and types. So, with misgivings, I agreed.

I believe that Mike Levine's Acorn Productions' inauguration of this type of festival is the first in the State of Maine. It was coordinated by Patricia Mew, who had taken part in one for 6 or 7 years in Massachusetts. And this is how it worked. On Saturday, May 1, the final and marathon day of the Maine Playwrights Festival at St. Lawrence Arts Center in Portland, about 7 pm, between the 5 pm and 8 pm shows, 5 playwrights, 5 directors, and 21 actors who had agreed to participate gathered in the theater for drawings out of a "hat" to determine how many characters the playwright would have in his/her play, who would direct the play in each case, and the actors who would be in each play, including information on their approximate age and experience. Also drawn were the rehearsal locations for the plays – one was to be at St. Lawrence, 2 at Acorn Studios in Westbrook, and 2 at different USM Portland locations. Furthermore, playwright/novelist John Manderino had been asked to select a location, a prop, and a sentence that must be used by all playwrights. The location was a ferry, the prop was a bottle of wine, and the sentence was, "Are you sure you want to go through with this?" Levine requested that the plays be limited to about 10 pages of dialogue.

Then the playwrights went home to write the plays, which were emailed to the directors by 8 am Sunday and subsequently emailed to the actors. Our playwright, Lynne Cullen, said she was writing until about 3 am because she changed her mind about her first idea and went in a different direction.. Liz McMahon, who was helping with the MPF strike at St. Lawrence said Carolyn Gage had called Mike Levine by 11 pm and said she had finished her play already! Michael Tooher finished his play by midnight after a 10 pm discussion with director Shawna Houston. Michael Kimball didn't want to waste time traveling to his York home and so stayed in a motel.

The actors gathered at the designated location, scripts in hand, at the time selected by the director, 9 or 9:30 am. (Unfortunately the two groups meeting at USM were locked out of their respective buildings at first because of a campus incident; Mike Levine's started rehearsing at a nearby picnic table, and Michael Howard's used the lawn, but eventually all made it inside.) Then the reading, digesting, blocking, and learning began. Everyone was given \$20 to use for lunch and dinner or whatever. So, yes, there was a break for lunch and later dinner could be sandwiched (pun not intended) between the assigned half-hour slots for tech that began at 3:30 pm at St. Lawrence.

Going on with or without the scripts was up to the directors and actors, but all the actors were either off book or mostly off book. Performances open to the public began at 7:30 pm.

Because everyone was busy, programs never got printed; instead the title, playwright, director, and cast were announced before each play as follows:

This First Annual 24-Hour Play Festival was funded through a grant from Maine Theater Fund administered by the Maine Community Foundation.

You may have seen Megan Grumbling's coverage of this inaugural festival in *The Portland Phoenix*, but this is my "two cents worth" with some input from Liz McMahon, who also covered the unfolding process as official documentarian.

To sum it up, none of my misgivings were realized. I could not have been happier with the play and director assigned to me! I thought the quality of plays and performances was amazing, so if the other participants agree, this may actually be the first of annual presentations.


