RUBIES TO DIAMONDS FOR THEATERS CELEBRATING 40 YEARS & MORE!

This started out as an article offering congratulations to those theaters that have stayed in business for 40 years, but after some research on the internet, I've decided to include all those Maine theaters that have managed to stay active that long and longer, even through economic downturns.



Penobscot Theatre Company at the Bangor Opera House

Penobscot Theatre Company of Bangor, celebrating its 40th anniversary season in 2013-14, the only professional not-forprofit theater in northern Maine, now led by Artistic Director Bari Newport and Managing Director Marcie Bramucci, was an offshoot of Acadia Repertory Theatre and was founded in 1973 by George Vafiadis and Lou Collier of ART, later becoming a separate entity. The first show in Bangor was Moliere's THE SCHOOL FOR WIVES in 1973. Artistic Directors have included Ken Stack (1983-88), who has also appeared on stage at PTC in a variety of roles that include a number of Decembers in A CHRISTMAS CAROL (Scrooge), HEDDA GABLER (Commissioner Brack), and as recently as last fall, BECKY'S NEW CAR. The tenure of Mark Torres as AD (1992-2005), who occasionally took a turn on stage, notably as Salieri in AMADEUS (he was in the original Broadway production, although not as Salieri), included a number of years of summer Shakespeare on the Penobscot River bank. In 1998 PTC bought the Bangor Opera House. For several years some performances were at the Opera House while those requiring more intimate space were still at 183 Main Street in the company's previous location, since then sold for use as a bank. Scott R. C. Levy followed until he left for another job in Colorado. During his time, as well as taking his turn on stage, he introduced the Northern Writes New Play Festival and got a grant to restore the original Opera House marquee. Bari Newport, who asserts that in spite of having done her share of acting she will not take a turn on stage, took over as Artistic Director on January 1, 2012, As well as overseeing the six-show season, and frequently directing, she has expanded the PTC Dramatic Academy and touring productions to schools and communities, and has introduced a number of innovations to draw in the community. www.penobscottheatre.org

Portland Stage Company also celebrates 40 years of plays with its 2013-14 season. It was founded as Profile Theatre by Ted Davis, who at the time was pretty much a fixture as an actor at The Theater at Monmouth in the summer repertory season. The company toured at first but settled in Portland in 1976 and Michael Rafkin was the Artistic Director for 1976-77. In 1978 the name was changed to Portland Stage Company, and during the tenure of Charles Towers (1978-81) it became an LORT Equity theater. Several Artistic Directors followed until Christopher Akerlind and Anita Stewart became Co-Artistic Directors in 1996, the first time designers had filled such a leadership position. Award-winning Lighting Designer Akerlind still maintains his residence in Portland but in 1998 left the leadership to Ms. Stewart, who has helmed the company ever since. In addition to the main stage season of seven plays, PSC offers Theater for Kids and maintains a season in the Studio Theater (as well as making it occasionally available for rental to other theater companies), which includes the new Studio Rep in January/February (three smaller theater companies are chosen to perform in rotating repertory to introduce their work to the community) and The Little Theater of the Unexpected in May, presenting new plays or works-in-progress since 1990. www.portlandstage.org

Acadia Repertory Theatre in Somesville on Mt. Desert Island celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2012. Its first plays were presented in 1973 in the Masonic Hall, which is converted each summer into a 148-seat performance space. The season runs from late June until Labor Day weekend and has included playwrights such as Sophocles, Shakrespeare, and Neil Simon and the annual favorite: an Agatha Christie mystery. In 1986 Ken Stack followed George Vafiades as Artistic Director and bought the theater along with the Managing Director, the late John Ericson. Stack, who also is head of the Entertainment Production Program at the New England School of Communications in Bangor, continues as Executive Director of ART but several years ago turned the artistic direction over to Andrew Mayer and Cheryl Willis, who continue the tradition of four main stage plays as well as a play for children presented two mornings a week.. www.acadiarep.org

Hackmatack Playhouse in Berwick, was converted from a barn on the family farm into a theater by S. Carleton Guptill in 1972. His son Michael Guptill is now the Executive Producer. (In July 1934 the barn on the farm at that time was struck by lightning and burned. Lewis Guptill began looking for a barn to replace it and found the perfect one across the street. He decided it would be easier to move it than to take it apart and rebuild it, so he had

the barn jacked up and rollers placed beneath it with a cable attached and running through a turnstile. A horse was hitched to the turnstile and walked in a circle, stepping over the cable on every lap. Since the barn moved at a pace of one-half inch per circle lap, this took about three days, including crossing Rte. 9 – fortunately much less busy in those days!) In the 1980's the barn was enlarged to include an addition to the back and expansion of the stage. The oldest building on the property is the "woodshed" which dates back to the 1600's and is currently used for rehearsal space and prop storage. The "mill" across the orchard from the "woodshed" houses the theater's shop operations and costume collection. Audiences fill the 218 seats in the playhouse to enjoy a summer of at least four plays and musicals from mid June to late August. www.hackmatack.org

The Celebration Barn was founded on a farm in South Paris in 1972 by internationally known mime/actor/teacher Tony Montanaro to encourage people to develop their own original theater. The "next generation of theater pioneers" are in residence during the summer in a creative community developing focused performance-study programs with worldclass teachers. [Alumni are performing on Broadway, in film and television, and at festivals and theaters around the world.] There are also weekly performances of faculty, students, and guest artists. Following Carol Brett, who was Executive Director of the Barn for 18 years (1989-2007), the current Executive Director is Amanda Houtari, who took over the helm in 2007 after two years as General Manager. Mandy first came to the Barn in 1991 to study Antic Arts with Fred Garbo. Then while performing and studying across the U.S. and in Europe, she missed the feeling of community that she had at the Barn and still returned "every summer except one or two to work, create, and play!" So it seems like a natural progression for her to end up in charge. Michael Miclon's The Odd Company was an offshoot of work at the Barn, as is the current touring trio of Amanda Houtari, Daniel Orrantia, and Aaron Tucker called The Fabulous Problemas, which was devised in Bogota, Columbia, and premiered at the Barn in 2011. www.CelebrationBarn.com

Surry Theatre in Blue Hill, founded actor/director/teacher Bill Raiten, a native of Brooklyn, NY, celebrated its 40th season in 2012. Raiten started the theater in 1972 as an acting school after finding that he loved directing at a children's summer camp in the Catskills, where he had done comedy previously. He came to Maine to start his school because he had studied Zen Buddhism with a teacher in Surry. He says, "I started the New Surry Theatre because I had to earn a living here and the only way I knew how to earn a living and stay peaceful and happy was with theater." His first students came from New York, Pennsylvania, and California as well as Maine, and that first summer culminated in sold-out performances of FIDDLER ON THE ROOF in a Surry barn. Soon NST expanded its reach with year-round acting classes and summer theater camps as well as the summer seasons of plays performed in various venues from Blue Hill to Ellsworth and other Maine towns (currently performing most often in Blue Hill Town Hall). In 1988 a visiting Russian director saw NST's season, which included LUV by Murray Schisgal, and invited Raiten to direct it in Russia in 1989 (with professional Soviet actors speaking in Russian). This led to some reciprocal visits. And from 1992 - 2000 TAW (Theatre Arts Works), developed by Raiten and other NST regulars as a program using theater and computers to help at-risk youth, was 85% successful in getting the participants back to school or into a lasting job. NST continues to offer diverse plays and a musical from spring to fall as well as sometimes a radio show at other times of the year and, of course, the school. www.newsurrytheatre.org



The Theater at Monmouth at Cumston Hall

The Theater at Monmouth was founded in 1970 by Richard Sewell and Robert Joyce. Sewell, long time professor of theater at Colby College, was the Artistic Director at TAM for over 20 vears, including the time when it was named "The Shakespearean Theater of Maine" by the state legislature in 1975. Sewell stepped down at the end of the 1995 season, and actors Michael O'Brien and Jeremiah Kissel, with a combined 32 years of theater experience between them, were Co-Artistic Directors in 1996; but O'Brien served alone 1997-99. Then in 2000 and 2001 David Greenham was on board as Managing Director with Barbara Bosch from California as AD. Greenham continued managing with Sally Wood as AD 2003-07 when Ms. Wood stepped down and he continued as Producing Artistic Director through the 2011 season. Dawn McAndrews, who used to be on the staff at Portland Stage Company before leaving in 1999 for opportunities with other theaters, returned to Maine full time in 2012 as Producing Artistic Director. TAM, well known, of course, for the Shakespeare plays, also stages classics, and its summer season is presented in true repertory, four from the Bard and classics plus a children's show, one of the few theaters in the country to actually do this. These plays are staged in the Victorian theater at Cumston Hall, a building listed on the National Register of Historic Buildings. In recent years the troupe has expanded its tour to schools and communities to include both spring and fall tours. Also in the fall it has become a tradition for TAM to stage a musical, frequently one by Gilbert & Sullivan. Last year a one-man version of the classic IT'S A WONDERFUL LIFE, was added in late November-early December and will be offered again this year, so this company which began life as professional summer rep has become a year-round professional troupe. www.theateratmonmouth.org

Camden Civic Theatre has been presenting plays and musicals since 1968 at the Camden Opera House, and the group considers that it's very fortunate to have this wonderful historic building as its home for most of its productions. The first plays they staged in 1968 were GUYS AND DOLLS and THE CRUCIBLE, and they continue to present diverse offerings

from T. S. Eliot's MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL to Neil Simon's comedies, Agatha Christie's mysteries, and musicals like KISS ME, KATE, THE MUSIC MAN, and SWEENEY TODD, as well as Shakespeare's ROMEO AND JULIET, MACBETH, and KING LEAR. This fall they will venture out of Camden to present THE MIRACLE WORKER at Northport Music Theater. Mainstays of the group include Paul Aron Weintraub and Scott Anthony Smith, both as directors and actors on stage. www.camdencivictheatre.com

Maine State Music Theatre in Brunswick was founded in 1959 by Victoria Crandall as the Brunswick Summer Playhouse, with the change to its current name coming in 1967. Ms. Crandall, in a field dominated by men in the saturated Straw Hat Circuit of that time, started out producing 9 shows, one a week. The next year she reduced the number of shows to 7, and by the mid-70's had changed to a non-profit organization with a commitment to develop and expand an intern program to train young artists, and reduced the number of shows to 5. The inaugural production was SONG OF NORWAY and since then MSMT has presented just about every musical that's out there at least once plus some world premieres like CHAMBERLAIN (about Maine's Civil War hero), IN THE BEGINNING, and LOVE IS SPOKEN HERE. Charles Abbott caught Ms. Crandall's eye, and she invited him to direct at MSMT in 1975. He continued to direct at the theater over the years and after her death in 1990 he became the Artistic Director, a position he held until he stepped away at the end of the 2010 season. Abbott was also known as an actor, with the MC in CABARET perhaps being his most grateful role. After Abbott left, Executive Director Steven Peterson, also well known as an actor, was in charge until resigning abruptly in the fall of 2012. Meanwhile, Curt Dale Clark, also an actor as well as an expert in the business of running a theater, has been the Artistic Consultant in 2013 and left his desk and the stage to greet attendees as they came up the steps of the Pickard Theater before a show. The Pickard Theater on the Bowdoin College campus, the long-time performance home of MSMT, was modernized and renovated in time for the 2000 season. And a couple of years after that MSMT bought a former bus garage at 22 Elm Street in Brunswick and turned it into a permanent home with administrative offices, rehearsal rooms, wardrobe and props storage, and set building space. www.msmt.org

Lyric Music Theater was organized in Portland in 1953 as Portland Lyric Theater, held auditions in December, and presented its first show, KISS ME, KATE, at Deering High School Auditorium, in February 1954. Three of the co-founders, Director Sadie Nissen, Music Director Frank Catir, and Choreographer Helena Jackson got that musical on the stage. Rehearsals were held at Three Arts Studio on High Street (theater and dance school run by Sadie and Helena), now displaced by the Portland Museum of Art. For several years the musicals were presented at Deering High School, with an occasional sidestep to venues like Frye Hall (no longer existing). The group had their own home on Stevens Avenue for a while in a building dubbed 'The Doll's House" and performed both there and at DHS. But unfortunately one night in 1971 it was totally destroyed by fire. Temporary quarters were found in Portland and shows took place at various venues until 1977 when they moved into their present location, a former church in South Portland. A few years ago the building was renovated adding a new lobby and refurbishment of the theater. Those original co-founders are gone now, but Linwood Dyer, although he was not in on the very beginning, came back to Maine in 1956 and soon became so involved with the theater over the years as an actor, director, choreographer, designer, and producer that some dubbed him "Mr. Lyric." He has now retired from active participation because of health reasons but continues to work on his collection of theater memorabilia in his home, which he plans to bequeath as a theater museum and archives for interested people to visit and do research. Meanwhile, Lyric Music Theater continues to present both classic and contemporary musicals from September to May, with a fundraising play in June. www.lyricmusictheater.org

L/A Community Little Theatre was founded in 1940 and in the early years operated out of a location on Sylvan Avenue in Lewiston until 1978 when the building was sold. The group searched for a new home and finally settled in 1981 at a school on Academy Street in Auburn, later named the Great Falls Art Center. Although CLT and the City of Auburn had already done extensive repairs over the years, in 2010 the City voted to close and demolish the facility in 2011 as too expensive to keep up, which would also displace other organizations as well. After a series of discussions in 2011 CLT's proposal to maintain and be fully responsible for the theater wing was accepted by the City. So the group is able to continue to offer a season of five plays and musicals in what has been its long-time home (although the summer musical is sometimes performed in another school which has A/C). A volunteer driven organization, CLT has many members who return again and again to serve as actors, directors, designers, stage crew, ushers, etc. A few of those, in addition to actor/director and current Artistic Director Mitchell Clyde Thomas, are Celeste and Roger Philippon, Richard Martin, and Jason Pelletier. www.laclt.com



Ogunquit Playhouse

Ogunquit Playhouse presented its first plays in a converted garage in the town square in 1933 and then moved in 1937 to the newly built building that is the present theater on Rte One, all this the result of the efforts of Broadway showman Walter Hartwig and his wife, Maude, to bring quality theater to venues outside of NYC. After Mr. Hartwig's death in 1941 his widow carried on and the year before she retired in 1951 she hired young actor John Lane as General Manager. Lane then acquired the theater with a business partner, Henry Weller, and became its Artistic/Producing Director and held that position for so many years that it is now known as John Lane's Ogunquit Playhouse even after his own retirement in 1994. At that time he spearheaded the formation of the not-for-profit Ogunquit Playhouse Foundation. After adequate endowment funds were

raised to ensure the care and longevity of the theater and grounds, Mr. Lane transferred ownership to the Foundation. Initially because of their friendship with Mr. Hartwig many stars of the 30's and 40's like Ethel Barrymore and Laurette Taylor came to perform at Ogunquit, and this continued through Mr. Lane's tenure. In 1999 Roy M. Rogosin was hired as Producing Artistic Director and the theater began producing some of its own shows, bringing back stars like Sally Struthers, who continues to return in some role each summer. Also the Children's Theater program was started. In 2006 Bradford Kenney was appointed Executive Artistic Director and has continued the theater's tradition of excellent performances along with improvements in the sound and lighting systems, and extending the season to run from May to October. The theater's 75th Diamond Jubilee Anniversary Season was celebrated in 2007. The New England Theatre Conference has acknowledged the Playhouse as one of the most important cultural landmarks in New England and also bestowed the 2011 Moss Hart Award for Best Professional Production for THE MUSIC MAN. www.ogunquitplayhouse.org

Gaslight Theater was founded in 1937 as the Augusta Players and claims the title of the oldest continually operating community theater in Maine, since it performed even during the years of World War II. For many years now the group has made its home in the Hallowell City Hall Auditorium. Gaslight presents four shows a year with occasional special events as well and aims for a balance of comedies, mysteries, classics and new plays, and musicals. For several years they have added a spring evening of one-act plays to attract new directors and actors looking for a shorter commitment. One of these plays then becomes the group's entry in MeACT's Annual One-Act Play Festival. A non-profit all volunteer organization, Gaslight is another with frequently returning actors and directors. Richard Bostwick is the present General Manager and sometimes also directs. www.gaslighttheater.org

Portland Players was founded in 1931 as the Portland Dramatic Guild with the name change coming after a hiatus during World War II, becoming active again in the mid 40's. Their first play was a one-act EAST OF EDEN and had the aim of raising money for scholarships. Roger Vinton Snow, composer of the official Maine State Anthem, was the first president. After some years of performing in the New Portland Theatre (eventually demolished to make room for the drivethrough and parking lot of a bank) they moved in 1967 to their present location in South Portland. For 20 years, 1970 until his death in 1990, Joe Thomas was Artistic Director. Since then a variety of directors from Brian Allen to Michael Donovan to Michael Rafkin have taken the helm as the community theater group presents a varied season of comedy, drama, and musicals from September to late May. www.portlandplayers.org

Children's Theatre of Maine was founded in 1923 by the Junior League of Portland as the Children's Theatre of Portland, adapting the name Children's Theatre of Maine in 1974. It is still the oldest kids' theater operating in the country. I'm not sure what the age mix of the actors was in the early years, but there was a time at least in the 1980's and 90's when adult actors played the adult roles and were paid. During all these years from the beginning, the performance venues varied, including Shakespeare in Deering Oaks Park and some tours as far afield as Aroostook County, until in the 90's, while Pamela

DiPasquale was Artistic Director, a lease was negotiated for the rental of a former retail space on Marginal Way in Portland. About 2006 the group lost its lease and the financial situation was perilous. Reba Short, returning from a 2-year stint with the Peace Corps in Morocco and a long-time enthusiast of children's theater, had kept in touch with friends she had worked with at Children's Theatre of Maine and announced "I'm back!" only to be told they were closing. She consulted with Lisa DiFranza, a former Artistic Director of CTM, who suggested that she might make a pitch to the Children's Museum of Maine to see if theater would work there and try to pick up the pieces. So she did and indeed it has worked out very well with plays presented in the little theater at the museum on Free Street in Portland in a year round season. So it is now the Children's Museum & Theatre of Maine. Reba is the Artistic Director in charge and also usually directs but sometimes brings in guest directors, and children are the actors. www.kitetails.org

And then, of course, there is Lakewood Theater near Skowhegan, which just closed its 113th season, having been founded in the early 1900's. Originally a Native American campground, then the homestead of Joseph Hayden and a meeting place for spiritualists, this area was a swampy amusement park when Herbert L. Swett took over as General Manager in 1899. The first legitimate stage play was THE PRIVATE SECRETARY opening on June 15, 1901. Swett, a Bangor native and graduate of Bowdoin College, envisioned a theater and summer colony in the spot on the shores of Lake Wesserunsett, and in the 1930's and 40's it was the summer theater of choice for the stage appearances of Broadway and Hollywood actors (many of them also appearing at Ogunquit). After Swett's death in 1945 his family held on to the theater until 1970, when they sold it, and for 15 years owners came and went. Then in 1985 a procession of pickup trucks drove up to the rear of the theater as Marti Stevens's Cornville Players arrived. A non-profit partnership of Stevens, Bruce Hertz, and Jeffrey Quinn incorporated as CUE (Curtain Up Enterprises). Ms. Stevens died in 1993 and Hertz left the organization in 2000, but Quinn remains in charge as General Manager and continues to guide the group through every season of a mix of both old and new comedies, dramas, and musicals running from May through September. Actors and directors return year after year for the chance to be on this stage, some involved in more

than one play a season. Oh, yes, I should mention that it's haunted, possibly by the spirit of Herbert Swett as well as displaced Native Americans, disgruntled spiritualists, and the energy of thousands of actors. (They do not, however, appear to be hostile!) www.lakewoodtheater.org

NOTE: Deertrees Theatre in Harrison was founded in 1936 and saw many famous actors on its stage when NY producer Bela Blau was in charge. There was a hiatus during WW II, a revival, and then another hiatus because of rising gas costs and low cash flow. It was repaired and revived in the 1980's by the Deertrees Foundation. Deertrees is not included in the above list because it has, unfortunately, not had a continual presence for at least 40 years.

MA RAINEY'S BLACK BOTTOM by August Wilson opened the 2013-14 season at **Portland Stage Company**, 25A Forest Ave., Portland, on Sept. 24, and it continues through Oct. 20. "Blues diva Ma Rainey and her band have come to a Chicago studio to cut a record, but their artistic differences nearly stop the session before it starts." In the cast are Tina Fabrique (Ma Rainey), Nyahale Allie (Dussie Mae), Kevin T.
