ANOTHER GREAT SUMMER AT MONMOUTH WITH THE BARD (AND OTHERS)

The Theater at Monmouth, designated The Shakespearean Theater of Maine by the State Legislature some years ago, is halfway through its summer season, but because it's a repertory company, you can still see all the shows between now and August 27, and then for more fun, hang around for the fall production of A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM!

This year Shakespeare is represented by THE TAMING OF THE SHREW, directed by Producing Director David Greenham, and starring Artistic Director Sally Wood as the nonconformable Kate and Tim Davis-Reed as the "shrew tamer" Petruchio, who has "come to wive it wealthily in Padua"; and, for the first time, LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST, directed by Bill Van Horn, with some interesting gender switches! Other plays in the repertory are Frank Galati's Tony Award-winning adaptation of John Steinbeck's THE GRAPES OF WRATH, directed by Jeri Pitcher, with Janis Stevens as Ma Joad and Richard Price as young Tom Joad; and David Hirson's LA BETE, directed by Lucy Smith Conroy, with Dustin Tucker as the (seemingly) obnoxious Valere with the "mile-long" (and, in Dustin's hands, hilarious) monologues.

However, says Producing Director David Greenham, "I'm really passionate about a good strong company of creative artists being together and doing great work – so it's more about the group than about the plays for me, because I think you need a great group to do great theater!"

So, again for this Equity company, now in its 36th season, Dave, along with Artistic Director Sally Wood, has gathered in the usual number of AEA artists; other seasoned professionals both from away and local, for acting, design, and technical support; and talented newcomers continuing to add to their experience.

As a Syracuse University graduate with a BFA in Acting and Directing, Dave Greenham, with a deep seated interest in getting the arts to rural communities, got together with fellow S.U. grads to form a theater company for just that purpose. "One of them," he says, "was really 'into' demographics and determined that the best place for us to do this was either in Mississippi or Maine. Since it was summer, we decided to head for Maine!"

Thus was Brown's Head Repertory Theatre founded, based originally on Vinalhaven Island and later in Monson, Maine – "as close as we could get to the geographic center of the state!"

This was in 1985. In March 1987 at the NETC (New England Theatre Conference) Auditions in Boston, one of the auditioners was Connecticut native Jeri Pitcher. At the time Brown's Head didn't have an opening for an actress, but later in the summer someone dropped out, and Jeri was invited to join them. In the fall that invitation was extended again, and Jeri, who had a similar interest in bringing shows to rural areas and who had decided that Dave Greenham "seemed like a nice guy," accepted

(requiring her to break a contract with another company). Two years later they married and eventually brought forth their favorite production: son Zach!

In the 1990's, after Brown's Head dissolved, they both taught theater in adult education, lived in Dexter and Kennebunk (at different times!), and Dave also wrote for a local newspaper and wrote grants for various organizations. His first experience with The Theater at Monmouth was as a subscriber in 1994.

"I loved the idea of it, and I loved the building (Cumston Hall). Then in 1997 (actor/director) Lew Alessio called me, wanting to use an adaptation I had made of AESOP'S FABLES; so I began to get acquainted around Monmouth. Then word got to Ben Lund, President of the TAM Board of Trustees, that I would be available to be Managing Director." He took the job for the summer of 1998 and then was offered a contract to stay on, which he did, eventually in 2000 becoming Producing Director.

Since then his position has evolved to the only full-time one at TAM, and he has brought the theater into a year-round presence: January-February, touring Shakespeare (with an NEA grant) to schools and communities that would otherwise have limited exposure to the Bard's work; April-May, touring to schools with plays such as this year's THE ODYSSEY, adapted and directed by Jeri Pitcher; pre-season events of a comedy and/or guest performances; the summer repertory season of two Shakespeare plays and two other classics and a children's show; and a fall musical, sometimes Gilbert & Sullivan, this year: FORUM.

Dave also takes his turn at directing, with last year's THE LIAR by Goldoni and this year's THE TAMING OF THE SHREW. And he sometimes turns up on stage as well in roles that include Uncle Sid in AH, WILDERNESS!, Samuel in PIRATES OF PENZANCE, Belarius in CYMBELINE, and Uncle John in the 2005 THE GRAPES OF WRATH.

Jeri, an accomplished playwright, has adapted and directed many of the children's shows, including THE SWORD IN THE STONE, ROBIN HOOD, ANNE OF GREEN GABLES, TOM SAWYER, and CINDERELLA. She won the Vermont Playwriting Award for CHASIN' NIGHT BIRDS, which in 2000 was produced in New York City and later in Los Angeles; and EDEN WISH was a finalist in The Last Frontier Playwriting Festival in Alaska (a festival usually attended by Edward Albee). For 20 years she has been touring as actor/director with the Found Story Workshop Program, which originated in Connecticut; and she is the creator and sole performer of TAM's History Theater of Ideas: The Androscoggin River Project. Her on stage experience, besides Brown's Head, includes the Camden (ME) Shakespeare Festival, East-West Fusion Theatre (CT), Seattle stages, and at TAM roles such as Titania/Hippolyta in A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM, Calpurnia in JULIUS CAESAR, the Courtesan in DANGEROUS LIAISONS, Gwendolyn Pigeon in THE ODD COUPLE, and Katherine/Holofernes in LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST. This year she is on a directing "roll" with THE ODYSSEY, THE GRAPES OF WRATH, and ... FORUM this fall.

Sally Wood, who was born in England but mostly grew up in the USA, came to TAM for the first time in 1998 as a recent graduate of Circle in the Square in NYC. Her work on other stages has included The Actors Centre in London, Peterborough Players (NH), Portland Stage Company (ME), and a year in Seattle. She is currently in the process of working on her MFA at the University of Tennessee, with one more year to go. TAM roles have included Cecily in THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST, Luciana in COMEDY OF ERRORS, Tracy Lord in THE PHILADEPHIA STORY, Sybil in PRIVATE LIVES, and, probably her favorites, Rosalind in AS YOU LIKE IT and Sally in TALLEY'S FOLLY. She has also taken her turn at directing, with IDIOT'S DELIGHT in 2004. In 2002, after a series of conversations with Dave Greenham about the theater and its future course, she was invited to be Artistic Director. After first gasping, "Are you crazy?!" she finally happily accepted.

"I love it here," Sally says. "It's like coming home. It's an extraordinary place to work, partly because the community involvement is so strong here."

Among the AEA artists returning to work with this company after a number of seasons here are Massachusetts-based Mark S. Cartier and Janis Stevens from California.

Mark is returning for his 9th season and this year plays Casy, the former preacher who goes along with the Joads in THE GRAPES OF WRATH and finally pays the ultimate price of love for this family; Elomire, the leader of the acting troupe in LA BETE; and both Dumaine and Costard in LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST. Mark told me, "Back in 1985 when I was in a show being performed at Bates College in Lewiston, some fellow actors said, 'We're going to see JULIUS CAESAR at The Theater at Monmouth. Want to come?" That was when he first heard of this company and, little did he know at the time, that he would be playing that title role at TAM in 2003! Then in the 1990's he was performing in a play at Worcester Foothills Theatre, back to back with one that had Michael O'Brien in the cast. O'Brien, who was Artistic Director at TAM at the time, dropped in on one of Mark's rehearsals and later remembered him and invited him to join the company in 1997. Mark has performed at Penobscot Theatre in Bangor as well and is also one of the dozen or more actors in a variety of roles in the longrunning SHEAR MADNESS in Boston. He has enjoyed all his roles at TAM but has a particular fondness for the part of Matt Friedman in TALLEY'S FOLLY, which he played opposite Sally Wood in 2002. His directing credits include THE LION IN WINTER (1999) and the adaptation and direction of ALICE IN WONDERLAND (2003).

This is the 6th season for Janis, whose credits elsewhere include Vienna's English Theatre, the International Theatre of Vienna, the Idaho Shakespeare Festival, the Monomov Playhouse on Cape Cod, Sierra Repertory Theatre (Sonora, CA), Sacramento Theatre Company, and San Diego's Old Globe. She has taught theater at the Fairbanks (Alaska) Arts Festival, and at American River College and Cosumnes River College in California. Directing credits include TALLEY'S FOLLY at TAM, THE TEMPEST at Arizona Shakespeare Festival, THE VAGINA MONOLOGUES in Los Angeles (also again in 2006), and she will direct ALL MY SONS for the Mendocino Theatre Company next spring. There's no room to list all the leading roles Janis has played elsewhere (from Billie Dawn to Albee's Martha) and at Monmouth, so let's just say that her favorites include Amanda in PRIVATE LIVES, Beatrice in MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING, Cleopatra in ANTONY CLEOPATRA, La Marquise de Merteuil in DANGEROUS LIAISONS, and Irene in IDIOT'S DELIGHT. She also has a one-woman show, VIVIEN by Rick Foster, about Vivien Leigh. She has not only performed it at a number of theaters in California as well as at Monmouth, and last September in NYC, but returns with it to New York for a September 3 opening at the American Theatre of Actors on 54th Street. Last year's single performance and this year's run (through September 23) are being directed by Peter Sander, her acting coach when she got her MFA at Ohio University. (Visit www.vivientheplay.org) Janis is also the caretaker of Tess, the Pug, who sometimes takes her turn on stage, most notably as Crabbe in TWO **GENTLEMEN OF VERONA!**

When I asked what kept bringing her back to Monmouth, Janis said, "What I absolutely love about coming here is that I can eat,

drink, and sleep theater – devote myself completely to what I love. And I also love being in a repertory company – there are very, very few <u>real</u> repertory companies left -- this is what I trained for."

People who run theaters have to audition actors yearly to fill any openings. Dave goes to Boston and New York, but a major source has been the United Professional Theater Auditions (UPTA) in Memphis, Tennessee, where Sally meets him so they can both look and listen. In 2003 they found Dustin Tucker, who is returning for his 3rd season at TAM. Dustin graduated from the Interlochen Arts Academy (a performing arts boarding high school) in Michigan and went right from there to New York at the age of 18. In NYC he was in THE RAINMAKER at The Roundabout (Broadway), and his other credits include SoHo Rep. Primary Stages, HERE, and the Williamstown Theatre Festival. Monmouth roles have included Orlando in AS YOU LIKE IT, Arlecchino in THE LIAR, and this year, Valere in LA BETE (with those killer monologues! – but he says, "I love the role!").

This year the UPTA auditions also yielded Kristala Pouncy and Henry Bazemore, both originally from Flint, Michigan, although they had never met before. Kris has her MFA in theater from Northwestern University and has been teaching and acting in professional theater in the Chicago area. At Monmouth she plays Bianca in THE TAMING OF THE SHREW, and roles in LA BETE and THE GRAPES OF WRATH. Henry just got his MFA in Theater from the University of Georgia, has performed in RICHARD III with Encore Theatre at the Richmond (VA) Shakespeare Festival, plays Lucentio in SHREW at TAM plus roles in LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST and GRAPES OF WRATH; and goes from here to play Paris in ROMEO AND JULIET at the Georgia Shakespeare Festival in Atlanta.

Richard Price, on the other hand, came to Monmouth by a somewhat different route. He is a graduate student in theater at Penn State (with one year left for his MFA), and a classmate/friend invited Dave Greenham to come and audition the class, which he did. "When he called and asked if I would like to do Tom Joad in THE GRAPES OF WRATH, I was really excited," he said and his face really lit up! Besides the younger Tom, Richard plays Tranio in SHREW and De Brie in LA BETE.. One of his classmates, Carmel Javaher, is also here this year playing Dorine in LA BETE, and various roles in LOVE'S and GRAPES.

Another actor in his first season here is Tim Davis-Reed, whose presence has been well covered in the local papers because he is a successful TV actor with 15 years in Los Angeles behind him, the recurring role of reporter Mark O'Donnell in THE WEST WING, and other credits that include a regular role on SPORTS NIGHT, and guest appearances on "24" and DESPERATE HOUSEWIVES. Tim was a fellow theater major with Dave Greenham at Syracuse University, and one day last year while checking out the website for S.U. Drama Department Alumni, he found Dave's name and The Theater at Monmouth and started emailing him, asking him about the theater. Dave invited him to come see, and so he did last summer, taking in three of the plays and also doing an audition because Sally had never seen his work. Subsequently Dave invited him to join the company if he was really serious about wanting to be here for the summer. Tim, who also does theater in Los Angeles and has performed with various other Shakespeare companies, including Shakespeare in Central Park, had longed for the opportunity to immerse himself in it, as is necessary doing rep at Monmouth. "It's everything I hoped for, and more!" he says.

Tim's wife and two daughters have joined him for the summer, and the older daughter, J.J., has a couple of roles in THE GRAPES OF WRATH. Tim plays Pa Joad in GRAPES, as well as Petruchio in SHREW, and Prince Conti in LA BETE.

The other two AEA actors are Nick Gallegos, with roles in SHREW (Hortensio), LA BETE, and LOVE'S; and Paul Buxton, currently based in Los Angeles, who has been here for several seasons but not all consecutively, and has roles in SHREW (Gremio), GRAPES, and LA BETE.

Also on the acting roster are Mike Anthony and Jason Paradine, both coming to TAM through the UPTA auditions. Mike, whose roles include Grumio in SHREW and Al Joad in GRAPES, just got his MFA in theater from Wayne State University in Michigan and goes from here to the Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park in Ohio. Jason came to Monmouth in 2004, stayed around for roles in the touring MERRY WIVES and THE ODYSSEY, plays Rose of Sharon's husband, Connie, in GRAPES and is also the Production Manager this year - that means, for one thing, he's the one who has to be sure the sets are changed between shows – because this is repertory, the set for one evening's show has to be struck and the one for the next show installed! And there's also Tracie Merrill, a veteran of several touring Shakespeare companies and now a fellow MFA candidate with Sally Wood at the University of Tennessee, who plays Biondello in SHREW as well as roles in LA BETE and LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST.

Among local actors is Caroline Hewitt of Falmouth, back for her 3rd season (as Rose of Sharon in GRAPES and other roles), having just graduated from Vassar – her time there included a semester in Paris at the Theatre Ouvert, where she did administrative work but also got acquainted with playwright Noelle Renaude, translated one of her plays, and then directed and acted in it at Vassar; She hopes to translate more of Ms. Renaude's plays in a future which includes moving to San Francisco in September for work in theater there.

Frank Omar of Hallowell plays Baptista in SHREW and several roles in GRAPES OF WRATH. Frank was Mr. Page in TAM's touring MERRY WIVES OF WINDSOR last winter and has many stage credits with Gaslight Theater in Hallowell and Monmouth Community Players.

Other local actors include Meg Richardson, Andreas Wyder, Diane Wyder, Tor O'Brien, Coleman Nation, Maxim Blowen-Ledoux, and yours truly; and (sort of local) Ralph (Granpa Joad in GRAPES)and Marion Barnes of Windham (summer) and Florida (winter). Ralph and Marion were stalwarts of Lyric Music Theater when they lived in Maine some years ago, continued with theater in Massachusetts, and are still very active in Florida with Venice Little Theatre and Lemon Bay Playhouse, where recently Marion directed FOXFIRE, and Ralph played Hector.

It would take all 20 pages of this newsletter to list all the members of this talented company, so I hope those who have been omitted will forgive me. Do go to performances and check them out.

Other directors this season are:

Lucy Smith Conroy (DANGEROUS LIAISONS in 2003 and AS YOU LIKE IT in 2004) for LA BETE (credits elsewhere include New York, California, and Portland Stage Co. (ME). Bill Van Horn for LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST – actor, director, and playwright with many credits in New York and elsewhere; TAM acting credits include Elyot in PRIVATE LIVES, Vandergelder in THE MATCHMAKER, Benedick in MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING, Harry Van in IDIOT'S DELIGHT – directing, HENRY V.

The adaptor and director of THE EMPEROR'S NEW CLOTHES, this year's children's show, is Tommy Schoffler.

The designers are: John Story, set and costumes for LA BETE and LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST, and set for THE TAMING OF THE SHREW: Marty Lynch, set (including the truck) for THE GRAPES OF WRATH; Allison Steadman, costumes for SHREW and GRAPES OF WRATH; Mike McGrew, costumes for LOVE'S LABOUR'S LOST; and Lynne Chase, lighting for all four plays.

Stan, Liz, and Carrie Keach of the Sandy River Ramblers, a bluegrass band, provide original music for THE GRAPES OF WRATH.

The AEA Stage Manager who has to keep the schedules straight and the actors informed for 5 plays is Jeff Meyers.

Special events coming up this month will be QUINNOPOLIS vs. HAMLET on Tuesday, August 16, and ALL IN THE TIMING by David Ives on Tuesday, August 23.

The history of The Theater at Monmouth goes back to a beginning in 1970, when it was founded by Richard Sewell, originally from Liberty, ME, and Robert Joyce of Wisconsin. Sewell had written a play and journeyed to Wisconsin to see a production of it at the university where Joyce taught and

directed the play. They struck up a friendship and found they both had the dream of a "little summer theater." Sewell remembered Cumston Hall in Monmouth, where he had attended the Gilbert & Sullivan productions of The American Savoyards when he was a teenager in the 1950's. And, the rest is history, as the saying goes.

The designer of Cumston Hall and the original painter of its murals was Harry Cochrane, photographer, composer, conductor, writer, painter, what you might call a Renaissance Man (and thought by some to come back as ghost from time to time to be sure his handiwork is properly cared for!). The small auditorium was designed as a concert hall. Using several ships carpenters, Cochrane had the floor shaped and curved so that it has a resonance, like a musical instrument. In the last few years several local community groups have raised funds for the expansion and revitalization of the Hall, which included restoration of the murals (by Tony Castro & Co.) and the stained glass windows. (Mr. Cochrane's ghost should be pleased!)

MSMT FAVORITE RETURNS FOR FAVORITE ROLE

"From 1975 for about 8 years I was almost coming here (to Brunswick) regularly. I'd walk down the street, and people would say, 'Hi, K. K. You back for another season?' I've missed 2 or 3 years since then, but it's like my second home. I love it here! I haven't been to the ocean yet, but I'm going – got to have that lobster on Bailey Island!"

Yes, Karen K. Edissi, who in her early years at Maine State Music Theatre was known to fans like me as K. K. Preece, first appeared on the MSMT stage, then known as the Brunswick Music Theatre, in 1975. A native of Anna, Illinois, where her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Mallams, still live in the southern part of the state near Kentucky, she went to New York City in 1970 with her first husband, actor John Preece. Because this is the name she was known under on the New York stages, she continued with K. K. Preece as her stage name until she married Canadian Dennis Edissi in 1989.

"I was doing Lola in DAMN YANKEES in Pennsylvania in 1975 when the lady who was playing Meg said to me, 'Have you ever heard of a lady by the name of Victoria Crandall in Maine?' I said, 'No.' And she said, 'Well, she runs this theater in Brunswick, Maine, on the Bowdoin College campus, and she really loves voices.' "I remember driving my car up from Pennsylvania to audition for Miss Crandall. I parked at the Port Authority and took a cab to her apartment on 54th Street near 6th Avenue. It was funny because my apartment for years was on 55th Street but about 3 blocks over near 8th Avenue. I sang *I Can't Help Lovin' That Man* and *I Could Have Danced All Night*. And she said, 'You're hired.' I said, 'Oh, my goodness, just like that?' And she said, 'Just like that. I just want you to lose 10 pounds.' I said, 'Okay.' I think I actually lost 16 or 17 pounds that season!

"Vickie Crandall really knew voices, and she gave me opportunities. She gave me my career. She set me up, gave me my Equity card, and mentored me. She was a wonderful lady – eccentric, but she knew talent, and she was really something!"

During 21 years in NYC, K. K. performed on Broadway, Off-Broadway, at Lincoln Center, and at the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia. Television credits include *Another World*, *Texas*, and *Kung Fu*. She has also been a soloist with orchestras such as the Portland (ME) Symphony Orchestra and the Shreveport (LA) Symphony, and has a solo CD, *Broadway Baby*.

"My first role in Brunswick was in THE SOUND OF MUSIC. David Canary was Captain von Trapp, and Teri Ralston was playing Maria. She asked me, 'Are you going to New York after this summer? Well, you can stay in my apartment.' Since then I've done THE SOUND OF MUSIC 5 times, including playing Maria and Elsa. I've never done the Mother Abbess yet; probably that's the next step. It's all part of the process!"

Other roles at MSMT have included stripper Tessitura in GYPSY, Reno Sweeney in ANYTHING GOES, Aldonza in MAN OF LA MANCHA, Agnes in I DO! I DO!, Nellie Forbush in SOUTH PACIFIC, Carlotta (who sings *I'm Still Here*) in the 2004 FOLLIES, and Ella in BELLS ARE RINGING.

"Ella was always my favorite role until recently. Now it's Mame at this stage of my life." (Editor's Note: I also remember her as the reporter in PAL JOEY with that great song *Zip*! It was a fine cast, but that song done by K. K. was the big moment for me.)

"FOLLIES was a special time, too, last year, with a cast that included Mark Jacoby, Ann Dawson, Ginger Prince, and Henry D'Alessandris (from the 1970's and 80's); and Ginger and Henry did that wonderful dance (*Bolero d'Amour*)"

Her work at the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia includes ANYTHING GOES, DAMN YANKEES, and MAME. In fact, a photo in the MSMT 2005 brochure shows her with a brass instrument, which I assumed was taken for GYPSY.

"No, no, that was from MAME, and that's my own bugle! When I was leaving home to come here – it took me about 13 hours to drive down from Kitchener (Ontario) – I threw that bugle in the car. I said, 'I've got take my own bugle,' which I did, and so we're using it in this production!

"The last show I did at Walnut Street was DAMN YANKEES. I played Gloria, the reporter. The actor who played old Joe was in the same cast with me 25 years ago playing young Joe when I was Lola! How times change!

"Chuck Abbott has directed me at Walnut Street as well as here in Brunswick. He has done wonderful things for this theater. He's my favorite director. I've worked with some wonderful directors, but he's still my favorite. We have done over 45 shows together. He has given me some wonderful roles! You know, he gives us typewritten notes. He'll take a piece of paper, type the notes on it, and lay it on your dressing table! And he's done a beautiful job here."

How did you get to Canada, K. K.?

"In 1986 I was cast as understudy to Judy Kaye, who played Lalume in KISMET, and we went with it to the Royal Arts Center Theatre in Toronto. She was never sick, so I never got to play the role, but that's where I met my husband. We were married in 1989.

"When I was going to leave New York, I thought, 'Oh, I'm going to have to re-start my life in a foreign country,' as my mother would say. But

there was a lady by the name of Marlene Smith, who was in New York auditioning people for MEET ME IN ST. LOUIS, and she was Canadian. She followed me out of a rehearsal at the Minskoff Theatre and said, 'I hear you're marrying a Canadian.' I said, 'I sure am!' She said, 'Well, you come to see me because I'm going to be doing a production of SIDE BY SIDE BY SONDHEIM.' So I did, and she hired me. That was the first thing I did in Toronto after KISMET. Then in 1990 I got to do Miss Adelaide in GUYS AND DOLLS at The Stratford Festival, an incredible production."

K. K.'s other credits north of the border include the Drayton Festival, Theatre Aquarius, and the Canadian premiere (and cast album) of NAPOLEON.

"NAPOLEON was a wonderful musical that never really got lifted off the page. I think they should have taken it earlier on the road for a little bit. I played Josephine's best friend, Therese, who was the one with all the money. She actually gave money to Napoleon when he was in hard times. She and Josephine were in prison together for about 5 years and were almost going to be beheaded, but then got out and went on with their lives. We did that show right in Toronto. It ran maybe a month and got mediocre reviews, and then it closed. It was done about two years later in London, I think, with a cast of opera singers. The music was incredibly beautiful!"

I asked Karen if her parents came to see her perform these days.

"I begged my Mom to come, but they feel they need to stay closer to home now in their 80's. But I remember my mother paid me the sweetest compliment. When I was still living in New York, she and my Aunt Mary came up when I was doing Ella (BELLS ARE RINGING) at the Equity Library Theatre. Chuck had directed it. At ETL you didn't get paid, but the best thing you could get out of it was to get an agent, and I did! My mother's compliment to me was, 'I totally forgot you were my daughter.' Isn't that a nice thing to hear?"

That's the nicest thing for any actor to hear!!

"I hope that I can just act 'til I can't do it any more. You know, I just finished BEAUTY AND THE BEAST – we closed July 2 at Lake Huron.

Opening night, the fellow who was playing Belle's father had a heart attack and died right on stage. He was 73 years old and a wonderful, wonderful actor. We had done the opening number and were in the dressing room when we realized nothing was happening on the monitor. He had collapsed during his duet with Belle. Our director jumped on the stage and said, 'Is there a doctor in the house?' There were a nurse and a paramedic, and they started CPR, but he was gone. It makes you really realize how short life is, but here he was doing exactly what he wanted to do. And he was an incredible performer. I don't think I ever did a show with him when he didn't come in to the first rehearsal knowing every line! We closed the show for two days but then re-opened."

So here you are, back to play your favorite role.

"Yes, it's too bad it's only 3 weeks. MAME closes on my mother's birthday, August 27. And you just close up shop and wait for the next gig. My husband, Dennis, will probably come here for the last week, and we'll drive back together to Canada (home is in the Waterloo/Kitchener area outside of Toronto). Then BEAUTY AND THE BEAST will re-open the last week of September and run to the first of the year – again in the Toronto area. I play the wardrobe – I'm as wide as this table – I'm an armoire! This was the Joanne Worley role in the movie version. Isn't it great to stay healthy and happy and love what you do?!"

Yes, and we hope to see you on stage for many more years, K. K.!
