HOW TO WRITE A MUSICAL

An Interview

[Knowing they were collaborating on a second musical, Cast & Crew approached Mary Lancey and Cathy Price for an article on their creative process. Perhaps they tossed a coin and Mary won!]

In pursuit of journalistic whimsy, I shall attempt to interview myself – employing the format of asking the question, "How Does One Write a Musical Show? Or, Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Writing a Musical and Were Afraid-to-Ask" as interviewed by and with Mary G. Lancey.

MGL: Is Cathy Nelson Price joining us today?

SELF: No. She thinks we might get better acquainted if we worked alone. However, she sends her regards.

MGL: Uh, OK. So, back to the subject. Just how does one write a musical stage play?

SELF: Very carefully.

MGL: What does that mean?

SELF: Well, one doesn't want to steal a plot idea or a melody line which someone else has already written. That's being careful.

MGL: Right. So you want to write something original. Where do you start?

SELF: You start with a basic plot idea and introduce sources of conflict to make it interesting. Or, to quote the author William Russo, "find a character who has a problem I cannot solve."

MGL: Do all your show plots contain this "problem"?

SELF: Yes. In the instance of our current show, *Power Surge*, the primary conflicts lie within the personalities of the characters themselves. A secondary conflict is their common need for money and why they decide to play the lottery (which is called Power Surge). And then, of

course, will any of them win or not? If someone wins, what will money do to their situation?

MGL: OK. So you have these problems or conflicts. What happens next?

SELF: You work out your basic plot line and figure where the song ideas will lie. This is a lonely task – sort of the blank canvas for a painter or the blank sheet of paper for an author – guess I should update that statement to a blank computer screen!

MGL: Do you and Cathy do this writing at the same time and place?

SELF: No. We work independently and occasionally telephone or e-mail ideas to one another.

MGL: Do you ever work face-to-face?

SELF: When we have enough material to justify a person-to-person meeting. Then, we toss ideas back and forth and drink lots of coffee.

MGL: Sort of brainstorming?

SELF: Exactly. Sometimes the ideas spark off one another and the character situations get pretty amazing.

MGL: Like *Laughter on the Twenty-third Floor?* (SELF nods.) Do you keep a writer's notebook?

SELF: Informally. I do write things down and keep the papers near my computer.

MGL: Give us an example.

SELF: Well, I have a friend from Illinois whose aunt was identified in the hospital as "Baby Girl, Female." From that moment on, she was known as Fe (pronounced FEE). Oh, yes, I received permission to use that name and idea.

MGL: Does Fe appear in this show?

SELF: Most definitely!

MGL: So, do you both write the story and the music?

SELF: Cathy writes most of the story or "book", and I write most of the music and lyrics. Cathy usually writes one song and makes suggestions regarding my stuff, and I contribute ideas and characters to her story.

MGL: A true collaboration.

SELF: Guess so.

MGL: Back to the how-to. What happens after you have the plot ideas and song placement down??

SELF: I start writing the songs.....

MGL: Which comes first? Music or lyrics?

SELF: The lyrics dominate. You can have an idea for a tune; but, the music has to be adjusted to fit the words.

MGL: OK, so there you are – writing songs and Cathy is writing the script?

SELF: Right. Cathy is working on dialogue and plot development while I struggle with words and music.

MGL: And then you have another meeting with coffee?

SELF: When I have a song which is completed to the point when it makes sense, I will call Cathy and sing at her. When Cathy has scenes to be evaluated, we meet and read dialogue.

MGL: How long does this go on?

SELF: Until we have an act or large chunk of the show completed. We read dialogue aloud, and I sing and play the songs.

MGL: Is the show finished then?

SELF: Not quite. There are lots of revisions and false starts – sort of like negotiating a labyrinth.

MGL: Are you like Mozart in *Amadeus*? You know, just dash off music without recopying?

SELF: Oh, no! I can get stuck on an idea until it becomes a broken record. The melody and its existing lyrics can literally take over your life. I got so hung up last summer that I accidentally backed the lawnmower over a rosebush....

MGL: Really. Did you get the thing resolved?

SELF: The rosebush got replaced.

MGL: No, the song.

SELF: Oh, yeah! After a few days the song presented itself.

MGL: Sounds frustrating.

SELF: It is. You feel like a rag doll being shaken by the creativity gods.

MGL: Do you worry about writing something which has already been written?

SELF: Sure do. I run the music by a knowledgeable friend who's a watchdog for similarities and technical problems. We don't want another *Hernando's Hideaway*.....

MGL: So, Cathy types on the computer and where do you work?

SELF: Yes, Cathy types and I write music in primitive shorthand along with the words. Then, I set everything down with my music software. The keyboard is hooked up to my computer, and I can play back the results. The software allows me to experiment with melody and meter, and I can see and hear the results.

MGL: Then you're done?

SELF: No, I print out the music and go play it on the piano. Singing and playing the music away from the computer is like looking at the stuff for the first time!

MGL: More revisions?

SELF: Yep. After I'm satisfied with the final results, I sing the final version for Cathy and give her a printout.

MGL: Does Cathy do the same with the script?

Yes. I proofread the script, and Cathy **SELF:** proofreads the music.

MGL: Then what?

SELF: In the case of *Power Surge*, we invited Brian Allen over, and I played and sang the score, and Cathy gave him a copy of the script.

Did Brian like the show? MGL:

SELF: I think so. He offered many constructive comments and is, still, very encouraging!

MGL: How long has this process taken?

SELF: About three years.

MGL: So long?

SELF: All the little mundane aspects of day-to-day living and family commitments slow things down....as well as thinking up new material. The creative process does not happen overnight.

MGL: Where do you get inspiration for this creative process?

SELF: We borrow characters and plot points from news items and people we have encountered. Incidentally, we do NOT base characters or situations directly on people we know. I know audiences and readers try to identify the characters with people they or the author knows. I can tell you for a fact that our characters are based on aspects of general behavior.

Like that old disclaimer on TV, MGL: resemblance between real persons living or dead is purely coincidental"?

SELF: Right. There is universality in human behavior. Just watch any Christopher Guest movie.

MGL: Like *Waiting for Guffman*?

Sure. People living in different parts of the country look at that movie and think those characters are based on people in their particular community.

MGL: So, *Power Surge* is still a work-in-progress?

SELF: Right now, yes.

MGL: Do you anticipate further "polishing"?

SELF: No. The staged reading and audience reaction will help us determine additional work.

MGL: When is the staged reading?

So, do you feel we have covered the reason for this interview?

SELF: Would you mind rephrasing that?

MGL: How does one write a musical show?

SELF: Very carefully.

MGL: Thank you for being here today.

SELF: Thank you.

In addition to writing and composing, Mary and Cathy have both been seen on local stages. Mary has also directed at Lyric Music Theater, and Cathy is a critic and writes the column Two On The Aisle for the Portland Press Herald/Maine Sunday Telegram and has previously written articles for Cast & Crew. Their earlier collaboration was on a musical titled PREVIOUSLY UNPRODUCED, which received a staged reading in Cape Elizabeth in September 2001, directed by Raymond Marc Dumont.

WHEN TEACHER AND PUPIL MEET AGAIN



"He's a lovely man," says **Al Duclos** of his former student **Tony Shalhoub**, pictured here as they greeted each other at the University of Southern Maine 2003 commencement, when the award-winning actor was the keynote speaker. Shalhoub had just won the Emmy for best lead actor in a comedy series as the obsessive title character in MONK, which he also produces for the USA Network. During his student days at USM, where he graduated in 1977, he studied theater in classes taught by Duclos, a faculty member there for over 20 years.

Besides other television shows and numerous films, Shalhoub also spent four seasons with the prestigious **American Repertory Theatre** in Cambridge, and received a Tony Award nomination in 1992 for best actor in a play for his role in Herb Gardner's CONVERSATIONS WITH MY FATHER.

Duclos, a Westbrook, Maine, native, got his first break as John Dillinger in YOU ARE THERE, a television show hosted by Walter Cronkite. (See Cast & Crew August 1997: This Professor's Life Is Legendary.) Later he acted with The Brattle Theatre in Boston, nicknamed "The Old Vic of the East" for their reputation for performances of Shakespeare and other classics. There he worked with Hume Cronyn, Jessica Tandy, Colleen Dewhurst, Fred Gwynne, as well as playwrights William Faulkner and Edwin Wilson. During this time he kept his ties to Maine, acting and directing at the Kennebunkport Playhouse. After returning to college and graduating from the University of Maine at Orono, he helped create the now highly respected Theatre Department at USM, retiring from there in the late 80's. In 1981 he performed in THE MARRIAGE OF FIGARO by Beaumarchais at ART, and also continued to perform from time to time with local theaters in Maine, including, in 1995, the role of Firs in Greg Titherington's adaptation of Chekhov's THE CHERRY ORCHARD for American Renaissance Theater at Portland's Oak Street Theatre.

A special project of Al's came to fruition in 1997 with the recording of a reading of THE DEATH OF al-HALLAJ by his friend and colleague Herbert Mason, later performed in a staged reading at the USM Portland campus in 2000. The piece is a dramatic narrative of the last days of the Persian Muslim mystic al-Husayn ibn Mansur al-Hallaj, one of Islam's most controversial figures, as he voices his thoughts on God, life, and the world in conversations with his son, an antagonistic jurist, a disciple, and the Caliph's mother, who was also a disciple, before his martyr's execution as a heretic in Baghdad in 922. Al Duclos played the role of al-Hallaj, as he also did at its first reading at Harvard in 1974. The 2000 recording became the basis for a reading of the work later at a conference at Notre Dame.
